The main item of business to be dealt with was the forthcoming annual meeting of the Board which is usually a supper meeting, and it was decided to hold this year's meeting on Tuesday, January 28th. No decision was reached regarding a guest speaker for the occasion and details in connection with the banquet were left in the hands of the entertainment committee.

The secretary, Harold Rodd, stated that Captain Basil Kelly had advised him that he intended to present a motion to the meeting that the Summerside Board of Trade go on record as supporting the other Maritime Boards in their support of the Chignecto canal project. In the absence of Captain Kelly His Worship J. Frank Arnett addressed the Board pointing out the many advantages to be derived from the canal and moved that the local Board support the project.

The motion was seconded by Councillor Lloyd Gorrell and unanimously passed. President Hickey referred to the recent official opening of the Summerside Airport and the fact that training operations would soon be in full swing with a personnel of about eight hundred men. He also spoke of the splendid publicity this Province and Summerside would obtain from the proposed non-stop flight of the aircraft from California to Summerside.
