Hartnett sparred briefly then waded in and landed a left to McKenna's face and the spectators cheered. Then McKenna tore in and in a whirlwind attack rained blows on face and body and shook of Hartnett's attempts to clinch whenever possible, and when parried by the referee rushed back to and heavy rights and lefts. Hartnett was rushed to the ropes again and again and took much punishment on his body. It was after McKenna had Hartnett against the ropes that he stepped back and when Hartnett stood up, landed a right to the jaw that dropped the Halifax fighter for the full count. The men are welterweights, but here weights at tonight's bout were not announced.

New Glasgow Club Holds Meeting

NEW GLASGOW, May 6. — At a meeting of the New Glasgow Amateur Athletic Club here this evening presided over by President J. J. McDonald, the club passed a resolution requesting that the C. A. A. U. of C. would send to Nova Scotia a party conversant with conditions in the Maritimes in the matters of sport, to investigate before taking further action. Taylor won the decision of the judges, but the popular verdict went to Goldstein. On the same fight card Tony Janoneri, the brunette batter of New York, demonstrated high qualifications for his coming championship meeting with Taylor by knocking Ray Ryeckel, Chicago 122 pounds, on a technical knockout in a seventh round.

Goldstein's constant left kept poking in Taylor's face, while his occasional right gave pause to the terra Haute lad's rushes.

At the same time members of the organization will express their opinion upon the club policy regarding the present amateur mix-up. While the A. A. A. has given the strongest support to S. F. Doyle, president of the M.P.B.A. A.U.C., there is a growing feeling that Mr. Doyle in continuing his defiance of the A. A. U. C. has overreached himself. A vote will be taken on the issue.

200 Rebels Killed

(Special to the Guardian) MEXICO CITY, May 6. — Special despatches from Emjara say military commandant Ferreira of the state of Jalisco has reported to the governor that about 200 rebels were killed in an encounter with federal troops.

Clarence DeMar Backs Nova Scotia Marathon; Picks Johnny for Olympics

BOSTON, May 6. — Clarence DeMar, noted marathoner, expressed great satisfaction over the selection of Johnny Miles as the Nova Scotia marathoner as to the reasons he quit the contest here last month which was published in the Morning Post here today.

"I had been hoping that Johnny would make a statement and put an end to the false reports being circulated hereabouts," stated DeMar, "and I was pleased to read the article in the Morning Post. I do not think that Johnny quit the race at seven miles and entered the officials' car with smiles on his face is dead wrong. To state that he quit because I was running away from him is a crying shame. I knew better and so did all my friends and those who wanted to have justice done."

"I knew when Johnny started the race that he would never get through. It was a sizzling hot day and the rubber running shoes he wore were perfect heat conductors. No man could stand it. It is as he states, if he had continued or tried to continue, he would have quit."

Meeting On Saturday Night To Reorganize The M. P. B.

Plans for the reorganization of the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada are progressing favorably. It was said yesterday by Colonel Norman P. MacLeod, representative of the A. A. U. of C., who was named by that body to reorganize the branch, following its suspension, due to its unconstitutional procedure by the executive. Colonel MacLeod has been in correspondence with men prominently identified with sport in the three provinces, and it has been decided to hold a meeting on Saturday night for the purpose of laying plans for the holding of a later meeting of representatives of the amateur clubs to perfect the reorganization. Colonel MacLeod has received the support of practically all those communicated with, and indications now point to the reorganization going through without a hitch. While it has not been definitely decided, it is probable that the meeting on Saturday evening will be held in Moncton, at the American Hotel there, as that city seemed to be the choice of a majority of those who will attend. 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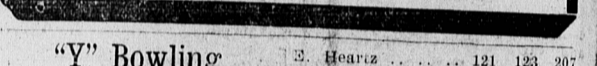

WILL REQUEST RELEASE OF PRISONERS TO MARK DIAMOND JUBILEE

MONTREAL, May 6. — With feeling that the benefits of the diamond jubilee of Confederation should be enjoyed as widely as possible, an amnesty for a considerable number of prisoners will be requested of the federal and provincial governments by the Canadian Prisoners' Welfare Association. This decision was reached today at the monthly board meeting of that organization here. It was pointed out that it was a time-honored custom in most countries on the occasion of any big national celebration to release a number of prisoners who would not otherwise enjoy such clemency, and in this instance it was suggested that the request should be sent forward to the Solicitor-General at Ottawa for special submission to the Cabinet with special reference to the case of a number of youthful offenders.
