A GERMAN VIEW OF BRITAIN'S NAVAL POWER.

Vice Admiral Siegel of the German navy in a recently published article refers in a friendly way to the distribution of military and naval strength among the great powers. He points out that on land Germany, Russia, France and Austria are so nearly equal in military forces that none of these states in the case of war with another, could be quite sure in advance of being victorious. But says Admiral Siegel there is no such balance on the sea. At sea Britain has such a preponderance that no other power in the world can vie with her. He has a very high opinion of the British navy, both of its strength and quality, and adds, "The thought that there is a power on earth which is as any moment able to destroy any other navy and so cut off from the sea the country concerned, carries with it some anxiety."

Admiral Siegel suggests that if any of the great continental armies had a like preponderance over others the Continent would feel it as an incubus. And then he makes this striking statement: "As things stand, the freedom of the sea for the states of Europe depends upon the English people's love of peace, and the British Government's wisdom being strong enough to avoid misuse of this maritime strength and the oppression of the other maritime states."

THE BATTLE BETWEEN LICENSE AND PROHIBITION.

The old battle between License and Prohibition that we had hoped was settled is on again and must be fought over once more. The bill now before the Legislature to license liquor traders should be a trumpet call for every friend and supporter of Prohibition to buckle on his armor and march to the field. If the bill is allowed to pass, which we cannot believe, the Prohibitory Law, the fruit of sixty years work by two generations of temperance men, will be rendered inoperative, strangled in the house of its professed friends.

Prohibition and license are entirely incompatible and antagonistic in principle and in operation. Placed together in the same field prohibition must cease. A few moments consideration of Premier Hazzard's bill will show what must be its inevitable result in a community such as ours. Any person, without restriction as to age, sex, color or character may obtain a license under this bill on payment of \$200.

What will he or she be licensed to do? In the language of the bill, "to take orders, solicit and canvass for orders, either for himself or any other person, for the sale, exchange, or purchase of any liquor within this Province or to be imported or brought into this Province." This throws the gate wide open!

How may the licensee do all these things, for himself or another? We answer again in the words of the bill: "Either by the production of samples, catalogues, printed or written matter or simply by word of mouth." No need for a written order from a doctor, or from the thasty party himself. Simply a verbal order, it may be given in a whisper—"get me a bottle, a case, a barrel of whisky." Or it might take the form of an order to deliver to the person ordering it, a supply from day to day for a year to come.

The licensee is under no restrictions so long as he has an order. There are no limits in the bill as to selling at any hour of the day or night, on any day of the week. But why go on? It seems incredible that such a bill should have been proposed at all. It seems doubly incredible that any friend of prohibition would seriously entertain the thought of supporting it. Surely if the Premier had consulted the friends and supporters of prohibition he would never have brought this measure before the House.

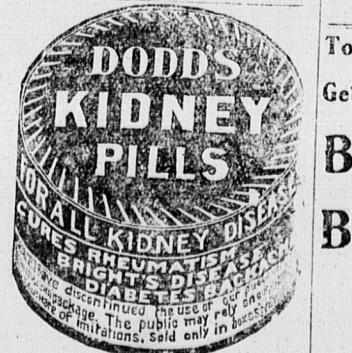

I am disappointed in Mr. Hazzard in this matter, and let him and every member of the House remember they will be well watched how they speak and vote in this matter, for it will be a guide to me and many others how to vote (if spared to see another election.)

I have supported the Liberals for many years, but do not propose to do so in this matter.

Why not both parties join in a memorial to the Federal Government to prohibit the sending of liquor into this Prohibition Province as they have done in the Scott Act Province of New Brunswick?

Adding the Labor and Nationalist members of the Liberals the Asquith Government would still have a majority of 341, a loss of 16 during the past three years. The German census recently published shows a total of 61,700,000 and an increase of 19 per cent in the last decade.

Before her latest record-breaking achievement the S. S. Mauretania had made the equivalent of 755 land miles in a day. But as the day's journey toward the setting sun is 25 hours long, her speed would be about 29 1/2 miles per hour.

The State of Victoria, Australia had a plentiful rabbit crop last year. The export of rabbit skins considerably exceeded the yearly average of thirteen and a half millions, and that number of rabbits, it is estimated would eat as much grass as 1,500,000 sheep.

The St. John Telegraph: "There is no political danger in prohibition. It would carry the province tomorrow if the people had a chance to vote on the straight issue. There is no doubt about it. The liquor vote is more than ever a negligible quantity. It has always been overestimated by New Brunswick politicians. Today it is a smaller factor than ever in this province, and it has not been a big one for twenty years. It is true that there are parishes, even counties in which prohibition would be beaten, but are these minorities forever to be allowed to set at naught the will of the majority which is opposed to the liquor traffic? The temperance people say, not, and they are quite right about it."

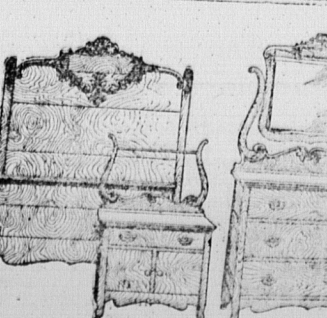
