First-born Live Longest.

The first-born of parents have a
much longer average of life than their
brothers and sisters who come after
them. This fact is demonstrated by sta-
tistics gathered by life insurance com-
panies. Longevity is also said to be
hereditary. Said an English insurance
man the other day:—
"Some persons have harder consti-
tutions than others, and they are apt
to transmit them to their children. A
man, both of whose parents were long-
lived, has a promise of a good old age
himself. This, of course, is an old
story. A much less familiar principle
affecting the duration of life has been
presented by Miss Mary Beeton of
Cambridge and Professor Karl Pearson
of London.
"A comparison was made between the
lengths of the lives of two adult broth-
ers or two adult sisters to ascertain if
there was a perceptible difference be-
tween the older and the younger mem-
bers of the pair. The figures here
given represent the average of over one
thousand cases, and hence would seem
to point to a general law. It may be
added that the particular persons under
investigation belonged to the Society of
Friends. That organization placed its
record at the disposal of Miss Beeton
and Professor Pearson.
"It thus appears that the average of
the older brother was 58.56 years, the
younger brother 54.575, the elder
sister 59.924, and the younger
sister, 55.667. There is a difference of
over four years in favor of the older
brother or sister. This does not sig-
nify that the older brother or sister
will survive the younger. The mean in-
terval between the births of all the
pairs under consideration was about six
and a half years. Hence the older
brother or sister would ordinarily die
first, though attaining a greater age.
"The first inquiry here mentioned was
limited to pairs, the younger members
of which had attained the age of 21.
A second comparison was made that
included minors with adults. It gave re-
sults closely resembling the other. The
mean excess of life in 3,855 pairs was
4.6 years. But the intervals between
the birth appear to exert some influ-
ence. Miss Beeton and Professor Pear-
son furnish a formula by which one's
expectations can be computed, and add:
"Thus a brother, born ten years before
another has probably seven years' greater
duration of life. A sister born ten
years before another has probably about
six years' greater duration of life."

The Palma Trophy.
The New York Sun, in a philosophical
editorial on the Palma trophy contest,
says:—The British victory, and the con-
sequent removal of the trophy across the
ocean, make it obligatory on the Na-
tional Rifle Association of America to
enter a team at Bisley next year. This
will require a special fund, which must
be raised by public subscription, for the
association has little enough money
now, and will call for special training
of the men from whom the team will
be chosen. The matches at Bisley are
shot rather earlier in the year than our
Sea Girt matches, so that the latter can-
not be depended upon to supply eligible
men for the team. The matter un-
doubtedly will be considered by the
association at an early date, and it is to
be hoped that arrangements, financial
and otherwise, may be made for putting
in a team that shall recall the glories of
earlier American teams, both here and
in England and Ireland. We congratulate
the British on their victory, and hope
for better luck ourselves next time.

Max Pemberton on Football.
In a letter to The London Daily Mail
Max Pemberton, an author whose stor-
ies are full of action, to say the least,
thus relieves his feelings:—
As a lover of football may I protest
at the beginning of the autumn season
against the new phase presented to us
by one of the national games? Those
who know and love "Tom Brown" must
often ask themselves what the great
football players of a past day would
think of the "hired ruffians" who delight
great multitudes nowadays and of the
waste of time engendered by their ef-
forts. We are told that the spectacle of
a great football crowd is one of the finest
this country can show. Well, sir, if
that be the case the country is in a sad
way indeed, and the national energies
are finding a grotesque outlet. That
crowds of fifty or even sixty thousand
people should gather about a ring to
watch twenty-two trained footpads
worrying a leather ball at so many
guineas an hour is truly a humiliating
exhibition. We are told that on such
fields Waterloo was won. It seems to
me that it would be truer to say that on
such Spion Kop was lost. For real sport
to one has a greater admiration than
myself, nor a greater belief in its value.
But argue not using all sorts of pro-
portion, and is it not a lamentable
reflection upon our national faith in
athletics, that unathletic Germany is turn-
ing out such splendid specimens of man-
hood as we saw at her recent manoeuvres,
while both France and Germany are
beginning to neglect us as commercial
opponents of the first grade? If
one-tenth the time now given to football
played by professionals were devoted to
technical training the pessimists would
find less justification.

Propos of Mr. Pemberton's letter the
following were the attendances at some
of the important matches on the open-
ing day of the British football season:—
At Sunderland v. Notts Forest, 15,000
people; Wolverhampton v. Derby
County, 8,000; Blackburn Rovers v.
Middlesex, 3,000; West Bromwick Al-
bion v. Everton, 15,000; Sheffield United
v. Sheffield Wednesday, 16,000;
Southampton v. Portsmouth, 7,000;
Fottenham Hotspur v. Gray's United,
3,000; West Ham v. Woolwich Arsenal,
3,000; New Brighton v. Stoke, 2,000;
Northampton v. Notts County, 2,000;
Liverpool v. Celtic, 8,000; Aston Villa
v. Small Heath, 5,000; Newcastle United
v. Glasgow Rangers, 3,000. These at-
tendances are, comparatively speaking,
quite small to what will be the rule as
the season progresses and the various
league and cup contests are in full
swing.
