Port Arthur Bear Cats Will Represent The West In The Allan Cup Play-offs

BAER TO MEET CARNERA-LOUIS WINNER, CLAIM

Jacobs Arranges For Bout In New York In September Next.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 1.—Mike Jacobs, fight promoter, announced tonight he had arranged terms with Ancil Hoffman, manager of heavyweight boxing champion Max Baer, for Baer to meet the winner of the Primo Carnera-Joe Louis bout in New York next September.

Carnera and the sensational Detroit negro are scheduled to meet in June in the Yankee Stadium under Jacobs' promotion. Jacobs, who represented the 20th Century Sporting Club, returned today from Chicago where he conferred with Hoffman. No contract was signed, he said, because Baer cannot enter into another contract until he completes a contractual obligation to Madison Square Garden, which has the champion's services until the end of June.

Whether Baer retains or loses the title in June he'll fight for Jacobs in September, the promoter said. Should the Garden fall in its efforts to induce Max Schmeling to come from Germany for a title bout with Baer, Jacobs said he is willing "to loan" James J. Braddock, Jersey City veteran, to the Garden for a title bout.

I. A. A. F. Bans Free State Athletes

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DUBLIN, April 1.—Irish Free State athletes today were banned from participating in any international competition, including the Olympic Games, by the International Amateur Athletic Federation.

This action came as an aftermath of the Irish Association's refusal to limit its activities to the Free State as ordered by the I.A.A.F. Athletes from the North of Ireland are not affected by today's action.

P.W.C. Hockey

By Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, April 1.—Picking up the challenge where their predecessors left it five years ago, Port Arthur Bear Cats tonight out-speeded North Battleford Beavers 4-1 to win the senior hockey championship of Western Canada and the right to represent the West in Allan Cup play.

The Bear Cats proved their right to a newly-acquired team-name by winning two out of the three-game series. They dropped the first game 8-2 but staged a whirlwind comeback to win the remaining two by scores of 4-3 and 4-1 respectively. The sailormen provided a spectacular finishing touch to a series that had its opening in a drab, one-sided exhibition.

FIRST PERIOD SCORELESS

The first period of tonight's game ended without any score and each team scored once in the second period. Bear Cats took the attack in the final period to score three goals and win by a wide margin in the closing minutes.

Entering the final game with an even chance to win, the sailormen moved into the lead early in the second period. Alex Sinclair, dark-haired wingman, flipped a pass to Ray Milton, chunky defenceman, who coasted in on Ken Davis to score from the goal-mouth. The Beavers tied the count when Davey Duchak took a pass from Bill Gilhooly four minutes later and flipped it over Jackie Nash's prostrate form.

Ports flashed an irresistible attack in the final period that churned Beaver hopes of a place in the Allan Cup final into the ice. Over-anxiety proved the undoing of the Beavers, as they swarmed in on the Port net four abreast. Sinclair caught them flat-footed when he snapped up a loose puck and dashed in with only Davis to beat. He hooked the puck past the netman within five minutes of the face-off. Ten minutes later he repeated the performance and Billy Thompson executed a similar play in the last minute.

CLAIM FAVORITE FRIGHEND BY FLARE BOMB

British and American Newsreel Men Vied For Strategic Positions in Race.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 1.—A new explanation of Golden Miller's failure to finish in the Grand National steeple-chase at Aintree Friday developed today when it was reported the red hot favorite was frightened by a photographer's old-fashioned flash gun just as he was getting ready to make a jump.

The incident, it was reported, was the upshot of a feud between British and United States photographers.

A 3-1 favorite, Dorothy Paget's Golden Miller "refused" to make a jump, spilled jockey Gerry Wilson and thus saved British bookmakers some \$10,000,000.

Certain British newsreel interests, it was stated, had purchased exclusive official photographing rights on the inside course, paying a price of \$1,500, but enterprising American rivals rushed up high platform towers at the last minute and stationed them at strategic points on the outside course.

When British cameramen discovered this it was claimed they attempted to storm one of the towers, knocking it violently and attempting to pull it down while American photographers were grinding away on it.

British police drove off the assailants, whereupon the British movie men were said to have resorted upon some strategy of their own. This was revealed when a flare bomb suddenly burst at a crucial moment, just as Golden Miller and the rest of the field approached the American cameras, cutting off their view and incidentally, it was said, prompting Golden Miller's \$10,000,000 balk.

World Champion Cardinals Are Favoured To Repeat

Change Dates Allan Cup Playdowns

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 1.—First game of the best two-in-three series, points to count, between winners of the Montreal Royals-Toronto All Stars and the Maritime champions, Halifax Wolverines, in the Allan Cup playdowns, will be played at Halifax Saturday, April 6. Cecil Duncan, vice-president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, announced here tonight. Second game of this series will also be played at Halifax, April 8.

Toronto All Stars forced their best two-in-three game series into a third match tonight when they trounced Royals 5-2 and it will be played in Montreal Wednesday night. This necessitated changes in the date for the Eastern Canada final, which was originally set for April 4 and 6.

Mr. Duncan also announced dates for the Allan Cup final at Halifax between Eastern and Western representatives for the Canadian senior amateur hockey championship. First game of this best two-in-three games series will be played April 10, with the second match April 12.

MAROONS MOVE TO TORONTO WEDNESDAY

Will Hold Two Work-outs Prior to Engagement, States Gorman.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 1.—Two practices, on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, will be Montreal Maroons training for their Stanley Cup clash with Toronto Maple Leafs, the first all-Canadian final since 1926 when Maroons defeated Victoria Cougars.

Manager Tommy Gorman said his team would leave Wednesday afternoon for Toronto so as to have a good night's rest before the Thursday night game when they will be pitted against Dick Irvin's bathing band.

Referees for the series will be appointed here tomorrow at a conference between Maroon and Toronto officials and President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League. The series continues at Toronto on Saturday, switches to Montreal next Tuesday and Thursday if necessary, with the fifth game also if necessary, at Toronto April 13. All games will be played to a finish.

Maroons were out for a skate on Sunday, following their tense game Saturday night in which they barely staved off New York Rangers' closing rush in the second game of their semi-final round. Today with the ice at the Forum marked out in a spectacular and colorful design for a charity carnival, the hockey men rested.

Show Complete Reversal Of Form To Trounce Quebec Titleholders 5-2

(Canadian Press, by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 1.—Toronto All-Stars showed a reversal of form and outplayed Montreal Royals, "dark horse" team of the Allan Cup play-downs, here tonight to score a brilliant 5-2 win in the second of their best-of-three game Eastern Canada semi-final series.

The deciding game will be played in Montreal on Wednesday. All-Stars, looked different from the team which took a 9-2 defeat from the Royals at Montreal last Friday and, after a scoreless first period, looked the ultimate winners all the way. Hard-shooting George Parsons, smart star wingman, led his teammates in scoring with two goals. Little Garney Large, big "Fud" Kitchen and Jimmy Fowler, each scored once.

ROYALS SCORE

Montreal banged in their two scores with less than four minutes to go on belated ganging attacks. Dave Neville got the first one with Normie Lamport, of the Stars in the penalty box. The wingman took a pass from Buster Munday to beat Andy Goldie from close in. Munday, a defenceman, shot the rubber past Goldie on an identical play one minute later on a pass out from Hugh Farquharson, tall centre.

A small crowd of 4,000 was dismayed early in the opening period when, with Montreal threatening to win, Captain Teddy Olliver fell to the ice with a broken wrist after crashing into a Royal rearguard. His place was taken by Jimmy Fowler, a defenceman, and Kitchen and Lamport were called on to do double duty for the remainder of the struggle.

The overconfidence which played havoc with All-Stars at Montreal was entirely lacking tonight as the squad set about a workmanlike attack and closely knit defence that shut out St. Germain and other Royal marksmen until near the end.
