"CANADA TOO PROUD NOT TO FIGHT" - T.R.

U. S. CANNOT AFFORD TO BECOME "YELLOW NATION," SAYS ROOSEVELT.

It is the danger that this country may become "Greatest of the Yellow Nations" This is a striking new phrase coined by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt in an article entitled, "The Lesson Canada Teaches Us," published in the March number of the Metropolitan. The Colonel writes: "Let our people profit by Canada's example and by the teachings of our own patriots. We are proud of the great past and our land. We cannot afford to have this country which ought to be and can be made the example for the free people of the world turned into the greatest of the yellow nations."

With reference to Canada's war contribution the Colonel writes: "Canada has sent to the front about 250,000 men. She has 150,000 more in training. This means that she has enlisted, all told, about 400,000 men. The casualties up to date are well over 50,000."

Meanwhile Canada has faced unflinchingly the necessary taxation, and has voluntarily contributed \$40,000,000 to relief funds. Let our people understand what these figures mean by remembering that Canada has only about one-thirteenth of our population and one-thirtieth of our wealth. Her shores were not immediately menaced; the councils of cold and timid selfishness, had they prevailed would have had her take a merely perfunctory part in the war, and rest in safety behind Britain's control of the ocean. But Canada was too proud not to fight. She scorned the ignoble role of shrinking duty, and letting others protect her. Her effort in men is relatively as great as if we had raised an army of over 5,000,000 soldiers."

Marine Engineers Looking for Trouble

QUEBEC, Feb. 11.-A demand of a raise in salary by the National Association of Marine Engineers of Canada has all the outward appearances of a serious menace to the navigation of vessels throughout entire Canada. According to Arthur Jolin, an officer of the Lewis branch of the association the members of the union, which has branches throughout the country, have asked the shipping companies of Canada to raise their salaries 25 per cent. He stated that should the union demands be ignored, efforts will be made by all members next spring to call a nation-wide strike of all shipping engineers which coming on the opening of navigation, would paralyze all means of transportation and bring shipping all over the country to a standstill.
