In Montague yesterday dealers were paying thirty-eight to forty cents a bush for new oats, twenty cents a bush for new potatoes, sixteen to eighteen cents a lb for butter, twenty-one cents a dozen for eggs, and ten dollars a ton for loose hay.

CONSTRUCTION TO BE STARTED.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—While no formal contract has been made to the Government for aid in Dry Dock construction, Companies are planning docks at Lewis and St. John.

The Harland & Wolff Co. and the C. P. R. have plans for the construction of Docks at Lewis and St. John, and the Canadian Co are willing to go in for Dock building at Montreal. There is a statutory provision for aid from the Dominion for dry docks on locations approved by the Government of a bonus of three per cent, for twenty years, on the cost up to a million and a half dollars. The Companies want docks to themselves and will apply to the government for them.

STEAMER ASHORE IN STORM.

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 15—The fine Canadian Pacific steamer Athabasca ran aground in a terrible gale last evening.

The vessel struck on Flower Pot Island, at the North end of Bruce Peninsula during a blinding storm, and is reported in a serious condition.

The Company are taking steps for the relief of the ship. The Athabasca's bow is high on a flat rock and the main part of the ship is in about fifteen fathoms of water. There are four feet of water in her hold.

GOOD WORK OF INSPECTOR NOBLE.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct 13—(Special by Phone)—D. A. Noble, police Inspector of Government Railways, arrived last evening in Summerside by the Express, with Irving Lewis in charge the young man, who with Leo McIntyre, did the many acts of theft and burglary, in and around Alberton. Mr Noble crossed over to the mainland on the morning of the 14th, with out a very indefinite clue as to the whereabouts of Lewis. While on board the Express he got chumming with a man from the western part of this Province, who passed as a cattle dealer. After sizing him up and landing at Point St. Charles, he wired for an assistant to meet him at Moncton. The assistant met him and was put on the trail of the cattle dealer. All three boarded the train going North, but the cattle dealer got out of the train at Bathurst with his very pleasant and agreeable fellow traveler, the unsuspecting detective's assistant. They went to a restaurant and had refreshments and were having a good time generally. Mr Noble had wired ahead for the Sheriff of Bathurst to meet him and he got around among the livery men and gave them the tip. He then took a team and drove out fifteen miles to a lumber camp and arrested young Lewis. Returning they found the cattle dealer and his friend endeavoring to escape, but when the cattleman saw young Lewis, whom he had known very well, he began to realize that he had been caught and acknowledged that he had been sent from the Island to warn the young Lewis of his dangerous situation and if possible to get him out of the way. He says now that New Brunswick is a hard place to secure a "steak." Detective Noble arriving here proceeded to Alberton by train with his prisoner. On the way over to this Province young Lewis confessed his guilt.

CROSSMAN WILL PROBABLY RECOVER.

MONTREAL, Oct 14—David Crossman, who was murderously assaulted near his home at Niagara, Albert county, on Tuesday night, is reported at the hospital to be doing as well as could be expected. Unless inflammation sets in he will probably recover. Mullineau, the man arrested for assaulting Crossman, is reported to have admitted to Constable Coppitts that he committed the assault. Mullineau, however, appears to be quite unrepentant. He is incarcerated in the jail at Hopewell Cape.
