### THE CENSUS.

It is certainly high time that the returns of the population throughout the Dominion should be made known to the people. The enumeration was completed months ago. There are thousands of evidences that the people are eager to know the result. That result has been approximately known to the chief census officials at Ottawa for weeks past. Why have they locked the secret up? The fact is that on this, as on previous occasions of taking the census an army of clerks have been employed and they have carefully nursed the job of tabulating the returns. The work is made to extend over years of time and the information collected is given out in dribbles, much of it long after it has ceased to be of any considerable public utility.

We had hoped that this year there would have been an improvement, and that the main features—the population of the Provinces—would have been given to the public in reasonable time. The three previous censuses of the Dominion were taken under Conservative management. In every case the Liberal journals of those days were loud in their complaints of the delay. Now we find that there is no improvement in regard to promptness in giving out the census figures. And nearly all the Liberal journals are framing excuses for the delay.

Recently the newspaper correspondent at the capital, naturally desiring to give an eager public the population figures, have resorted to guessing and speculation. Mr. Blue, who has charge of the census work, thinks it apparently consistent with his position to intimate to the press that he knows the result but will not tell. This is undignified as it is unsatisfactory. Recently an "estimate" of 5,400,000 for the population of the Dominion was made by somebody. This was submitted to Mr. Blue, who was asked if it was approximately correct. He replied, we are told, with an emphatic shake of the head, "It is all guess work and is evidently far astray."

Mr. Blue thus chooses to say that a given estimate is either far above or far below the truth. This is not an answer fitting to be given by a man in his position. He should have been either more reticent or less reticent, or have held his peace altogether. The conviction grows that Mr. Blue as a census man has not been the right man in the right place.

The other day our despatches told that the Labor Council in Montreal was taking action to prevent the acceptance of Mr. Carnegie's offer of \$150,000 to endow public libraries in that city. In some cities of the United States similar action is being taken by the labor unions. In Eastern Pa. the organizations go further, affirming that if a Carnegie library is set up they will prevent their people from using it. This action is taken because the labor organizations declare Mr. Carnegie to be "a foe to labor."
