In the death of Mr. John Cadmore, which occurred on Thursday, one of our oldest citizens has been removed. Mr. Cadmore emigrated from Devonshire, England, to this Province in the year 1842 settling at Winsloe Road, where he farmed successfully until 1863 when he removed to Summerside and has since resided here. He had been confined to his house for the past few years from the effects of old age, having lived 86 years. Only two out of six children survive him, viz., Mrs. Wm. Corney and Mrs. D. D. Cruz, both of Summerside.

MR. and Mrs. Josiah Howatt were passengers on Captain Thos. Howatt's boat on his last trip of the season across the Strait. They were returning from Denver, Colo. where they had spent more than three months, visiting their son who resides there. Leaving that city at 10 p. m. on Saturday the 23rd, ult., they arrived here in time to take dinner with their son and his wife in Cape Traverse on the following Thursday. The journey was a very pleasant one all through, notwithstanding having to drive in a sleigh, at night from Amherst to Cape Tormentine. Mr. Howatt says Denver is one of the finest cities he has ever visited. At first he wondered why it was so far in advance of other cities of the same size, which he had passed through on the way. Forty-one years ago it consisted of a few log cabins, but is now the rich capital of a thriving state. The wealth of Colorado is derived chiefly from its mining and agricultural industries, the products of the former, for the year 1900 alone, amounting to \$58,937,664, and of the latter \$34,709,000. The manufacturers of the city of Denver employ 15,211 men, whose wages amount to \$9,092,000 annually. There are 143 miles of street railway, affording employment to 500 men, at from \$2.20 to \$2.80 per day. It possesses some of the finest public buildings in America, including the State House, Court House, and the Public Library (containing 77,000 volumes), as well as numerous churches and schools. Go where you will you cannot get out of sight of a school. The superintendent of education and the majority of the teachers are ladies, and their salaries range from \$50 to \$100 per month. In fact, all classes of working people receive much better pay than in the east. This and its beautiful climate go far towards making Denver an attraction for everybody. From the middle of November to the last of February, there was not a shower of either snow or rain worth mentioning and seldom frost enough to freeze water out of doots. Every year large numbers of people go to the city for their health, and most of them when once there, make up their minds to stay.
