Meyer; and under his pastorate the famous church became a "hive of industry." His keen interest in all that concerns young people and his outstanding ability as a leader brought him the honor of being elected as President of the World's Sunday School Association at its great Convention in Glasgow in 1924, an office which he retained until this year. He is also President of the Christian Endeavor Union of Great Britain.

### IN MEMORIAM

MISS MARGUERITE WOOD

The people of Lake Verde and surrounding districts were indeed shocked and deep sorrow was expressed on every side when news was received by wire on Friday April 4th, that Miss Marguerite Wood, R. N., had passed away in the New York City Hospital at the early age of 24 years. The deceased was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Owen Wood, Lake Verde. After finishing her education at Notre Dame Academy, Charlottetown, she entered the employ of Moore and McLeod Ltd., where by her kindly and obliging manner she won many friends who were deeply grieved to hear of her death. Four years ago Marguerite, as she was familiarly known to her many friends, left her Island home and took up her residence in Boston. After remaining there for a year she decided to take up the noble profession of nursing and accord-

ingly proceeded to New York where she entered St. Vincent Hospital to train. After three years of careful study she passed her examinations and graduated with high marks in January last. Shortly afterwards she obtained a responsible position in the New York City Hospital, which place she held at the time of her death. Only one week before her passing, the deceased was stricken with mastoid and after undergoing a successful operation, suddenly took a turn for the worse and on the above mentioned date peacefully passed to her eternal reward. We cannot understand why one so young with seemingly everything to live for and with such a brilliant career stretching before her, should be called away so suddenly, but God who is all wise doeth all things well. Marguerite was a girl of splendid character and by her loving unselfish disposition and affable and courteous manner made friends everywhere and will be greatly missed by her many friends and acquaintances, but no where will she be missed more than in the family circle. Besides her grief stricken parents she leaves to mourn two sisters and three brothers, Regina, Mildred, Patrick, who went to New York to accompany the remains home; Parnell and Willie, at home, to all of whom the Guardian tenders sincere sympathy. The funeral which was largely attended and testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held took place from her late residence on Wednesday, April 9th., to St. Joachim Church, Vernon River, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. P. D. McGuigan who also officiated at the grave. The remains were tenderly laid to rest in Vernon River Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs.
