Bonus Increase

(NANAIMO, B. C., Oct. 28.—A telegram stating that an Order-in-Council had been passed at Ottawa increasing to five cents per ton the bonus on Vancouver Island bunker coal and giving a bonus of \$1 per ton on exports except to the United States, was read by C. H. Dickie at a meeting of the Conservative Association here. The telegram was signed by Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Mines. Colleries officials, interviewed today, were jubilant over the announcement and stated that the increased bounties would materially help their business. One great effect of the bunker bounty would be to hold ships, including probably three ocean liners, to coal for steaming purposes, and generally discourage the conversion of coal burners to oil burners. Regarding export business, it was stated that one company at the

beginning of the year shipped two cargoes to Peru and had made arrangements to carry on and extend its business. When, however, only a bounty of 25 cents a ton was granted by Ottawa the business had to be cancelled. However, the officials are confident they can get this trade in Peru and are hopeful that it will reach as much as 30,000 or 40,000 tons a year. The immediate result would be increased production and employment for some of the miners who have been thrown out of work.

Wants U. S. Tariff Lowered

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 28.—Thomas W. Lamont, a partner in the J. P. Morgan banking firm, went on record today as opposed to "excessive protectionism" and urged judicious lowering of the U. S. tariff as a means toward solution of world economic problems. "A country cannot become overwhelmingly the creditor of the rest of the world and at the same time remain a high tariff nation," he said.
