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**Library Presented With Book On Advertising Consider Lilies Of old Bermuda A war casualty**

A book entitled "The Economic Effects on Advertising" by Neil H. Borden has recently been placed on the shelf of the Anson McKim Memorial Section of the Legislative and Public Library. This section is added to annually by the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association from a fund created over twenty years in memory of the man who founded the first Canadian advertising agency - Anson McKim.

The conclusions reached in this 900-page volume are the result of four and one half years devoted to the study of advertising by the Graduate School of Business of Harvard University. The project was headed by Professor Neil H. Borden and was conducted under the sponsorship of the Advertising Research Foundation, an organization combining the Association of National Advertisers and the American Association of Advertising Agencies.

It is a factual and impartial study, done thoroughly over a considerable period of time, and presents all sides of the case for and against advertising, which has been in the public consciousness in the decade that has recently passed.

For those who create, buy and sell advertising, the book is valuable, as well as to those whose business it is to work in the world of advertising, and also to study and discuss advertising as an academic problem. Among the subjects dealt with is why advertising tends to increase or decrease distribution costs, whether it tends to reduce production costs, to perpetuate concentration of supply, to increase price rigidity, to improve quality or range of products, and to increase or decrease our real national income.

Many consider it one of the really important books on advertising published in this half-century.

**Weekly Live Stock Market Report**  
SUMMARY

Moderate supplies of cattle offered again helped to boost prices on Eastern cattle markets and most classes were 25 cents higher. **Western Cattle Markets**

A moderate run of cattle was cleared at TORONTO at an advance of 25 cents on all except bulls. Weighty steers sold at \$9.25 to \$10.25, with a few \$10.50 and butchering material cleared mostly at \$8.50 to \$9.75, with a few steers to \$10.25. There was a light offering also at MONTREAL and an advance of around 25 cents and good steers \$9.50 to \$10.50 and good cows \$7.25 up to \$7.50. In the MARITIMES receipts were light and quality mostly common but good to choice steers were still quoted at \$9.25 to \$10.

**United States Market**

Canadian steers and heifers sold at Buffalo during the past week ranged from \$10.25 to \$11.25, other one load at \$11.35 and another at \$11.50. These sales would equal slightly better than current Toronto prices. With shipments of Canadian cattle from western Canada to the United States having almost ceased, there were no recent quotations from St. Paul.

Exports for the week included 3,894 head of cattle, 229 dairy and 1,045 calves. Shipments to date this year under the first quarterly quota total 44,106 head cattle. Dairy cattle exports are 1,139 and calves 3,882. Exports in the same period last year were 15,367 head cattle, 1,458 dairy and 5,715 calves.
