Approval of the Boy Scout movement in Greece, and assurance that he would do all in his power to further its success was expressed by Prime Minister Metaxas, following a parade of Scouts at Patras.

During the annual Phalgu Fair in the Punjab, India, attended by some 1,500,000 pilgrims, Boy Scouts again played important service roles. A large and well organized Scout camp was divided into brigades, or service departments: Messengers, First-Aid, Hospital, Swimming and Life-saving, Bathing Ghats, Each Scout of each brigade had been provided with typewritten instructions, clearly defining his duties. The camp was organized by the Provincial Secretary of the Punjab Scout Association.

Remarkable evidence that drought conditions have not killed the desire for education comes from the pupils of the Violeddale school at Airways, in one of the drought areas of Alberta. Writing the Boy Scout-Girl Guide Sunshine Toy Shop at Calgary, the children asked for school books rather than toys as Christmas presents. Mention of the appeal in the Calgary Herald brought prompt response, and it is certain that these stout-hearted children of the prairies will receive not only the desired school books, but toys and other gifts as well.

Alfred C. Bossom, a British M.P. has presented a handsome silver challenge shield to the Boy Scouts of Bathurst, Gambia, in recognition of the habitual good turns performed by these colored Scouts for tourists calling at that West African port. The shield was accepted on behalf of the Gambian Scouts by Mr. Ormby Gore, Secretary of State for the colonies. From time to time letters from tourists, especially women travellers, have told of the services rendered by the African Scouts at Bathurst and Freetown, and the fact that like Scouts elsewhere the boys refused to accept any rewards.

During the autumn flooding of the Mulhand river, Sarangah State, India, valuable relief work was done by the Sarangah Boy Scouts, under commander Rajkumar Naresch Chandra Singh. The Rajkumar is a trained Scout leader.

A Scottish Boy Scout in kilts at the head of the parade was the feature of a Scout celebration at Patras, Greece. The parade included mounted Scouts, cyclists, hike

trek carts, ambulance Scouts, Sea Scouts and Wolf Cubs.

A party of over a hundred British athletes left England December 4th to compete in the Empire Games at Sydney, Australia, next February. The party is headed by Sir James Leigh-Wood, chairman of the Council for England of British Empire Games. Sir James also is Treasurer of the Boy Scouts Association.

A first aid station for motoring casualties has been established by British Rover Scouts at Bignell's Corner on the Barnet Bypass road, near Barnet, The station, which cost \$300 to equip, is manned every Saturday afternoon and evening and all day Sunday. Over 30 Barnet Rover Scout, qualified to wear the St. John Ambulance Association badge take turns on duty. The roads in the vicinity have been the scene of numerous accidents.

The trustees of the British Museum have presented six volumes of the scientific records of the National Antarctic Expedition of 1901-1904 to R.R.S. "Discovery", Captain Scott's famous ship, now a headquarters and training centre for British Sea Scouts. These valuable books have been added to the Ship's museum of nautical and scientific instruments and other mementos of Arctic and Antarctic explorers. "Discovery" now lies in a permanent berth off Temple Steps, in the Thames.
