THE American steam yacht Canarda, owned by Mr. Chas. J. Canfield of Chicago, entered the harbour early Saturday afternoon and docked at the wharf at the foot of Pownall Street for coal. The Company making the tour consists of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. J. Canfield of Chicago, Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Babcock, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Savigart, Miss Gail Gardner of Manistree, Michigan. The yacht carries a crew of 16 men and is in charge of Captain Bunker. The Canarda is painted white and is a very yachty looking craft. During Saturday night the yacht sailed for Gaspé. Those who saw the Canarda are of the opinion that the yacht is one of the most modern American steam yachts, having a length of 126 feet. The engines and boilers are of the best that could be put in a yacht. Her maximum speed is 15 knots and cruising speed of 13 knots. The owner's quarters are forward on the lower deck, and consist of a large double state room. There are three other single state rooms and a bath room on the same deck. The drawing rooms are aft of the engine space on the main deck. The yacht is rigged with two pole masts, and is fitted with all modern conveniences, such as an electric lighting plant, etc. The interior is finished in polished mahogany and carpeted with green velvet pile carpet. The furniture is also of polished mahogany and the draperies are of the finest chenille. The settees are upholstered in velvet of green, the woodwork being hidden from sight. The interior is simply a dream, and when the yacht was designed the owner had the plans to conform to his own ideas.

**Y. M. C. A. WORKERS**

Jubilee Day at the Big Convention Was Most Successfully Observed.

Boston, June 14.—"Jubilee day" at the international convention of the Y. M. C. A. began in the morning at Mechanics' hall with a session picturesque and novel. After formal addresses by Cephas Brainard, of New York, President Faunce, of Brown University, and Rev. Francis F. Clark, the presentation of foreign delegates went on again. James Spokes, of New York, presided, with Christian Phindias, of Switzerland, acting as master of ceremonies.

A striking figure was that of Father Nicholas P. Vassilief, a delegate from Russia, gowned in the deep crimson silk of his office, a silver chain and crucifix about his neck.

A special jubilee service in the old South meeting house, at which a commemorative tablet was unveiled; a reception by Governor Crane at the State house, and a special service in Faneuil Hall, served to fill out the afternoon.

The evening meeting in Mechanics' hall was given over to the railroad branch. Hon. John J. McCook, of New York, presided, and highly praised railroad men as a class. Letters were read from prominent railroad officers. President Lucius Tuttle, of the Boston and Maine railroad, made the principal address. The railroad branch he considered the most important branch of the association. The work among railroad men, he said, is a business proposition, and must be conducted on business principles and financially supported. The railroads are willing to contribute, but the men must carry on the work.

Cephas Brainard and J. G. Gannon, both of New York also spoke. Mr. Gannon concluded with an appeal for funds and ushers distributed envelopes for contribution.

While this was being done Ira D. Sankey sang "We shall meet beyond the river, bye and bye," the audience in the right and left galleries alternately taking up the refrain at Mr. Sankey's request.

It being the annual service in aid of the P. E. Island Hospital the discourse by Rev. G. M. Young in the First Methodist Church yesterday evening was on that line. The congregation was large and the collection was good. The music was of a high order, the rendering of the anthem, "I will sing of Thy Power" being especially good.
