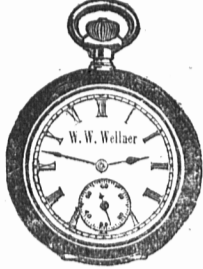

**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

SPECIAL music, good ice at Leap year  
 skate.

THE Preachers' Association will meet  
 in the First Methodist church, Charlot-  
 tetown on Monday, March 7th at 2.30 p.m.

THE Leap year skate tonight promises  
 to be largely attended. This special  
 feature of the year has been very popular,  
 and with good ice and splendid band  
 music a pleasant night awaits both  
 skaters and promoters.

EASTERN NOTES.—The weather still  
 keeps cold and blustery, and but little do-  
 ing in country districts. The roads are  
 nearly deserted only for the postman who  
 with difficulty tries to keep up posted as  
 regularly as possible in the news of the  
 outside world. Farmers are trying to  
 haul wood when the weather permits,  
 and looking after their stock. Any other  
 work or hauling is out of the question on  
 account of storms, cold, banks and deep  
 snow. Many want to get threshing done,  
 but the stacks are loaded with snow, and  
 James Leet can only get a day now and  
 then fit to attend to those waiting for  
 him.—John Ryan is building a lobster  
 factory at Priest Pond, one more to the  
 many studding the north shore already.  
 Fred Stewart has taken the contract of  
 floating the schooner "Citizen" stranded  
 at Black Point during the fearful gale  
 and snow-storm of Dec. 5th 1902. It will be  
 remembered that the present owner,  
 Thomas Kiekham failed in his efforts to  
 get her off last summer.—The Gulf and  
 Straits, as would be supposed, are still  
 filled with heavy ice, which will tend to  
 keep the winter long and spring late.

ON Friday evening last the Literary and  
 Debating Society of Alberry Plains held  
 their weekly debate in the school-house;  
 the vice-president Shaw McMillan oc-  
 cupied the chair. As the night was fine  
 the hall pro-tem, was filled to the doors.  
 The debate on "Which will a man do  
 more for to escape punishment or to gain  
 a reward" was opened by Alex. McMillan  
 in a well-words and logical address  
 teeming with historical facts, in which he  
 showed that man will do more to escape  
 punishment. He was responded to by  
 Chas. McMillan who with a fluent stream  
 of philosophic oratory, sparkling with  
 intellect and imagery, electrified the  
 house. Then followed A. Lannan who up-  
 held Alex. in an argument, brief, profound  
 and exhaustive. Instead of rant, decla-  
 mation, stilted and witty points, it was  
 calm, clear, learned, dignified, and a com-  
 plete exposition of the whole subject; the  
 speech of a scholar, and showed that he  
 was an accurate and laborious student of  
 history. There was compressed into it  
 such an amount of historical learning,  
 stated in the simplest language, as with-  
 in such a compass is perhaps unparalleled.  
 His arguments were utterly refuted by  
 Geo. W. Kebos who in language  
 lavish in the riches of expres-  
 sion, and gorgeously metaphorical,  
 with a roll of periods beautifully  
 harmonious, and with thought accumu-  
 lating upon thought—a union of sense and  
 splendour such as cannot be listened to  
 without emotion, struck upon the aston-  
 ished audience with novel and marvel-  
 lous sound. Applause burst forth. Victor  
 McMillan, of soul too noble for any  
 selfish hesitation, followed and upheld the  
 theories of Mr. Lannan; although the dis-  
 cussion seemed in some measure ex-  
 hausted, yet such was the energy of his ap-  
 peal, such the extent of his information  
 and such his delineations of character,  
 so warm, so animated, so pathetic, that  
 the house was moved into intense wake-  
 ful attention until the speaker ceased  
 amid a mighty burst of unanimous ap-  
 probation. Master Johnnie Hynes im-  
 mediately arose in reply and in a brief  
 and concise speech interlarded with  
 gems of wit and humor stated that  
 there was no use in debating with school  
 teachers for they reminded him of the  
 famous teacher in Auburn:

"In arguing too the parson owned his skill,  
 For 'e'n though vanquished he could  
 argue still,  
 While words of learned length and thun-  
 dering sound  
 Amazed the common rustics ranged  
 around,  
 And still they gazed and still the wonder  
 grew  
 That one small head could carry all he  
 knew."

Mr. Jenkins concluded the debate in an  
 address delivered with his usual eloquence.  
 He complimented both sides of the debate  
 for their powers of oratory and said, all  
 he had ever heard, all he had ever read  
 when compared with the speeches of the  
 evening dwindled into nothing and  
 vanished like a vapor before the sun. The  
 vote being taken resulted in a tie; the  
 vice president refusing to give the casting  
 vote. The subject chosen for the next  
 night was, "Who gains the more infor-  
 mation the reader or the traveller."

W. S. Louson delivered an admirable  
 lecture to a good audience at Cardigan  
 Bridge on Friday evening. His subject  
 was Prince Edward Island, illustrated by  
 stereopticon views and the subject was  
 well handled by the talented lecturer.  
 The chair was occupied by Rev. J. C. Mc-  
 Millan and a hearty vote of thanks was  
 passed at the close of the lecture.

THE British and Foreign Bible Society  
 was organized on March 7, 1804. Since  
 its organization it has accomplished much  
 in the dissemination of the Bible. It ex-  
 tends for one single object—to supply every  
 man with the Holy Scriptures in his own  
 mother tongue. It concerns itself solely  
 with circulating that Book which is the  
 Charter of Christ's Church throughout  
 all the world. In this aim it unites  
 Christians of almost every communion.  
 Since it was founded in 1804 it has issued  
 more than 18,000,000 copies of the Scrip-  
 tures, complete or in parts, in 367 different  
 languages and dialects. It is promoting  
 translations or revisions in over 100 lan-  
 guages today. It supplies all our Foreign  
 Missions with the vast bulk of the copies  
 which they need. It employs 800 colporteurs  
 and supports over 600 Biblewomen.  
 It spends \$350,000 every day, and it issues  
 3000 copies every working hour from Janu-  
 ary to December. Hundreds of people  
 and tribes still remain without a single  
 Gospel in their own tongue. In hundreds  
 of languages imperfect translations need  
 to be revised, and unfinished Bibles need  
 to be made complete. The spread of edu-  
 cation especially in foreign countries, is  
 raising up millions of new readers every  
 year. The enterprises and triumphs of  
 Christian Missions are creating so many  
 new and imperious claims upon the  
 Bible society. In all quarters of the  
 world closed doors are opening and eager  
 hands are stretching out to welcome the  
 Book of God. The Society aims during  
 this centenary year to raise a special  
 thank offering of \$500,000, conceiving  
 that is the lowest sum which will at all  
 enable the Society to answer these irrel-  
 atable appeals. If every one who posses-  
 ses a Bible of his own would show his  
 gratitude by some personal gift, this sum  
 could be raised many times over. The  
 P. E. I. Auxiliary Bible Society have in  
 common with auxiliaries all over the  
 Christian world called upon every church  
 to celebrate this centenary by special  
 services on Bible Sunday March 6th and  
 by special collections to be taken in be-  
 half of the centenary fund. In addition  
 to the Sunday Church Services there will  
 be a mass meeting of the Sunday Schools  
 in the First Methodist Church on Sunday  
 afternoon at 3.30 o'clock and a public  
 meeting in Zion Church on Monday eve-  
 ning at eight o'clock.
