BIGGEST BATTLESHIPS R IN SUEZ CANAL

SUEZ, January 6. — The United States Atlantic battleship fleet sailed two days ahead of its scheduled time, the next to the longest of its world-girdling cruise, by arriving here this morning from Colombo. The distance is 3440 knots.

When the fleet had come to anchor, the Egyptian and canal authorities went aboard the flagship and welcomed Rear Admiral Sperry, who expressed regret that he was compelled to curtail his stay in Egypt, but hoped that at some future time an opportunity would be given him to visit Cairo.

It had been expected that a representative officer of the fleet would visit Cairo and be presented to the Khedive on the anniversary of his accession to the throne, Jan. 8.

YANKTON FIRST TO ENTER CANAL. The converted cruiser Yankton entered the canal at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and the supply ship Coleridge passed in later the same night. Both are going to Messina at full speed. All arrangements were made by wireless for the ships to pass through the canal, and they thereupon sailed for Port Said, where 25,000 tons have been ordered for them.

The canal authorities have made special arrangements for all the battleships to have a clear run through the canal as quickly as possible will not stop at any of the numerous stations where ships usually tie up to permit the passage of vessels, which ordinarily have the right of way.

COOL WEATHER. With cooler weather the officers of the fleet will shift from their white to blue uniforms. All of them are looking forward to interesting visits in the Mediterranean and many are arranging flying visits to Cairo and the Pyramids.

The news of the disaster in Italy was received in profound sorrow by the officers and men of the fleet. In reply to a message sent to him by the navy department, Rear Admiral Sperry said that he had supplies available for distribution to the Italian earthquake sufferers as follows: Beverages, 50,000 quarts; bread, 400,000 pounds; cereals, 80,000 pounds; fruits, 20,000 pounds; fresh meat, 80,000 pounds; other meats, 100,000 pounds; vegetables, canned, 80,000 pounds; milk, 30,000 gallons; and also numerous other items.

BIGGEST SHIPS EVER IN CANAL. The American fleet is the most powerful to pass through the Suez

canal. Great Britain often has sent squadrons to the East along this road, but none has been more than one-half as large as the American circumnavigators of the globe.

The passage of the canal is regarded as a safe one, even for 16,000-ton vessels such as the Connecticut class, which will be the heaviest fighting ships that ever have gone through. The canal is somewhat more than 28 feet deep. Vessels of the Connecticut class require 26 feet 9 inches.

The canal is 87 miles long, and ships go through under their own steam. The speed is limited to six miles an hour, and by using electric lights many vessels now pass through at night.

Leave to go through the Suez canal will cost the United States government, with guarantee and other duties, not far from \$150,000. The regular tolls are \$147 per ton. British shipping companies which use the canal are continuously complaining against this rate, which they aver is unreasonable and an excessive tax on commerce. The Suez Canal Company's rate of dividend on \$10,000,000 capital has been from 24 to 28 per cent for a number of years.

The views which the officers and men of the American fleet will have in passing through the canal in part will be splendid and in part dull, but always with vast historical backgrounds. Suez in itself is a sordid, dirty port, yet Mt. Sinai rises far on the left and violet-colored mountain ranges on the right. The canal cuttings run through some dreary expanses of sand, but the way is varied by lagoons and lakes.

Muzzled in 1600 square miles in area, and through it the channel is marked by buoys. Flocks of pelicans, flamingoes and herons feed in the marshes. The bitter lakes are the biblical waters of Marah. Port Said, the Mediterranean terminal of the canal, with a population of 40,000, is almost wholly a commercial growth following the construction of the canal. No shore leave will be granted there.
