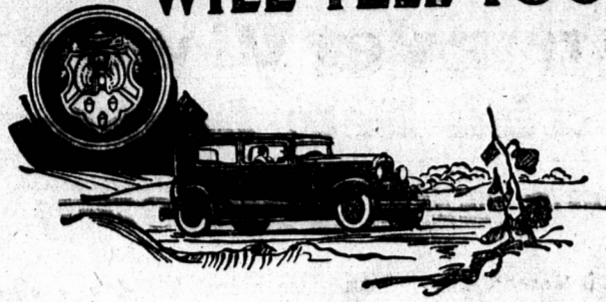


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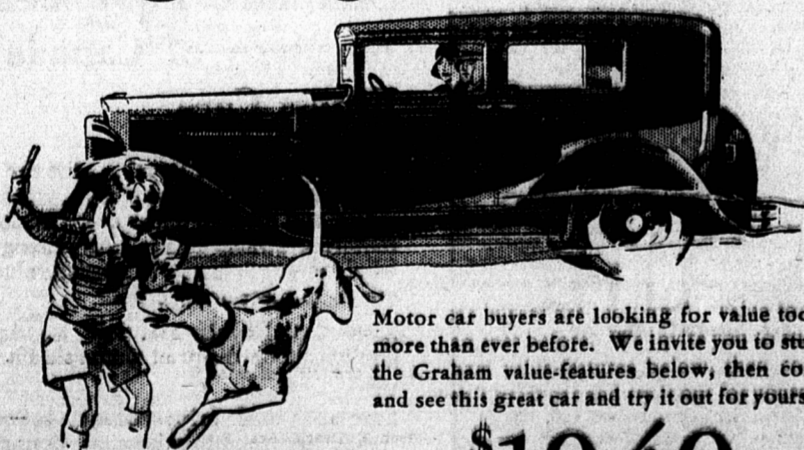

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### Houde Had Big Majority

MONTREAL, April 9.—Mayor Camille Houde, Opposition leader with Quebec Legislature, was returned to office in the civic elections today with a majority of 41,634 over his only opponent, Alderman J. A. Mathewson, who lost his deposit. Not only was Mayor Houde re-elected with an overwhelming majority, but at least 18 aldermanic candidates who had pledged themselves to support the Mayor in his campaign to "oust the clique at City Hall," were successful. This means that Mayor Houde will have a bare majority of supporters in the City Council which numbers 35 aldermen. The final count for the night in the mayoralty contest gave Houde 78,217 votes and Mathewson 36,583. Alderman Joseph Mercure, who was nominated for the mayoralty but publicly withdrew after his name had been placed on the ballot papers, received 2,000 votes. There were four small polls to hear from.

#### CENTRE OF INTEREST

Apart from the mayoralty contest, most interest centered in the outcome in Hochelaga ward where William Tremblay, one of Mayor Houde's chief lieutenants in the Legislature, was opposing Alderman A. A. Desroches, chairman of the Legislative Committee of the City Council and chief opponent of Mayor Houde at City Hall. Desroches won with 2,249 votes, Tremblay receiving 1,669.

Mayor Houde's battle cry throughout the campaign was "out with the clique at the City Hall," and he urged the electors to send him back with enough supporters in the City Council to carry through his policies. Of a published list of candidates who were said to have pledged their support to Mayor Houde, at least 18 had been elected.

Alderman Mathewson appealed to the voters as an English-speaking candidate. Montreal had not elected an English-speaking mayor since 1907. He argued that Mayor Houde wished to replace "clique" rule with a clique of his own.

#### GIVEN OVATION

Mayor Houde visited the City Hall at 9.30 p. m., when his own election and the election of a majority of his supporters had been assured. He was given a tremendous ovation by a crowd that grew to such proportions that police reserves were necessary to keep the lines of traffic open and clear the entrances. Several of his aldermanic allies were also present and enthusiasm ran high.

On a platform with Mayor Houde was Madame Houde and their three children and their appearance was the signal for such an outburst of cheering that those compiling the late returns in an adjacent chamber were forced to take a recess until the clamor subsided.

"They said I was the spoiled child of the metropolis," Mayor Houde exclaimed in a voice husky with emotion and worn by a fortnight's constant speech-making. "They see tonight how far they were mistaken." In his words of appreciation he made special reference to the English-speaking voters. "We find a great majority in the English-speaking wards. That is due to the good heart of the English people," he added.

Throwing his arms over the shoulders of his daughters while Madame Houde stood proudly by, the Mayor exclaimed: "I want to tell my wife and my daughters here and now that this is an example of what a simple honest man can secure from the people of this city. Give it on your memory that the bounty of the people goes to those who walk honestly."

Fifteen aldermanic candidates as well as Alderman Mathewson, lost their deposits. Among the defeated candidates were 16 members of the last City Council.

#### BEER AT ALL COSTS

BERLIN, April 9. (British United Press)—Despite mounting taxes and economic depression Germans are sticking loyally to their national beverage.

Though authentic and complete figures as to beer consumption are not yet available, statistics of beer production show that more of the famous beverage is being made now than at any time since the war.

In the fiscal year 1928-29 the breweries of Germany produced about 7,800,000 gallons of beer more than in the previous 12 months, total production reaching the remarkable figure of 1,209,862,500 gallons.

While this total is still about 90 per cent below the prewar figure, it is pointed out that Germany has since lost Bohemia, the land of Pilsener, whose production helped swell the German total before 1914.

This increase in beer production is good for the Government coffers, which for the 1928-29 fiscal year benefited to the extent of 397,000,000 marks (\$19,850,000.) Worked out on the per capita basis this means that every German last year paid more than \$1.50 in beer tax.

#### GIANT SOVIET GLASS FACTORY

MOSCOW, April, 9. (British United Press)—Construction has been begun in the city of Lissitchansk, Ukraine, on what is destined to be
