Cochrane Suffering From Grave Skull Fracture Given Only Even Chance To Live

IN THIS CORNER

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 26—Given only an even chance to survive, Gordon Stanley (Mickey) Cochrane, popular catcher-manager of Detroit Tigers, lay almost motionless today in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, his skull fractured in three places by the shattering impact of an accidental "bean ball" thrown by Irving (Bump) Hadley, New York Yankee pitching veteran.

Possible infection of one of the sinuses, dangerously close to the worst fracture, was the fearful threat faced by "Iron Mike" in his fight for life. Except for that, his physicians said, his chances of recovery would be bright. Sinus troubles, however, long have plagued him.

"If Cochrane can continue as he is for another 48 hours without complications setting in, he will likely make a satisfactory recovery," predicted Dr. Robert Emmet Walsh, staff physician for the Yankees who is in charge of the case. "The fracture unfortunately connects with one of the sinuses and a possibility of infection is therefore a danger."

As far as could be determined from brief bulletins and statements issued by doctors in attendance, Cochrane spent a fairly comfortable day. Last night, he suffered a slight hemorrhage but was given a good night's rest through the use of opiates.

Cochrane's closest friends were the most hopeful for his recovery. Crestfallen and wet-eyed, the ball players on his club and newspapermen reasoned that if a will to live counted anything Cochrane would win his fight.

They also recalled that "Iron Mike" had been injured under strikingly similar circumstances in 1931 when he starred with Philadelphia Athletics. As yesterday, he was "beaten" on his next appearance at the plate after hitting a home run.

At the time he was believed seriously injured but he recovered within a few days and batted .349 for the season, going to the Tigers as manager in 1934 to win the first of two successive American League pennants.

All visitors were barred today from the sick room. Mrs. Cochrane, who flew to her husband's bedside was admitted, however, and talked with him briefly.

"He told me he had lost sight of the ball about three feet from the plate and could recall nothing of what happened after that," she said.

Hadley, who has been pitching in the American League for 11 years, was absolved of blame.

Peters Holds British Golf Title Hopes

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SANDWICH, Eng., May 26—(CP Cable)—Husky Gordon Peters of Scotland loomed tonight as the chief hope for retaining the British Amateur Golf Title in the United Kingdom as most of the British stars met defeat in the third round of the simon pure tourney.

The United States threat for the title won by Hector Thomson of Scotland a year ago became serious as Cyril Tolley, twice champion, and Arthur D'Arcy Locke, 19-year-old South African phenomenon, lost.

Twenty-eight Empire players, most of them little known, and four Americans will contest the fourth round tomorrow morning. The fifth will be played in the afternoon, leaving eight players for the quarter-final round Friday morning.

British hopes were also placed on J. J. P. Pennik in the struggle to keep the title in the United Kingdom for the second straight year. The last United States holder, was Lawson Little, now Canadian open champion, who could not defend his honors in 1936 as he had turned professional.

Pennik caught Tolley on a wild day and scored a smashing 4 and 3 victory. The veteran former champion was erratic after the turn, when he was one down. On the 11th he took four shots to reach the green; and on the 13th he topped his drive and took four shots to reach the green. Then four down, he could do no better than half the 14th and 16th to end the match.

Dick Chapman of Greenwich, Conn., and John O. Levinson, Chicago holder of the New England title, were the chief United States hopes while accompanying them into the fourth round were Wilford Wehrle of Racine, Wis., and Robert Sweeney, of New York and London.

Peters, 26-year-old Scot was the only member of the British Ryder Cup team still in the running to-night. He defeated Locke 3 and 2 in the third round. The brilliant young Scot, who holds both the open and amateur titles of his native country and had the best amateur score in the British open last summer, took an early lead that he could not hold.

Looke scored a birdie three on the second hole, dropping a six-yard putt, but Peters evened the match with a birdie two on the third. On the fifth both drives landed in a patch of sand. Peters topped his shot but Looke three-putted allowing his opponent a half.

Thereafter the South African's putter failed to sink a four-footer that would have squared the match on the 12th and was allowed no more chances by his brawny opponent.

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 25—Behind Lefty Gomez's steadiest pitching of the year, the Yankees clubbed the leaderless Detroit Tigers 7-0 here today for their sixth straight win.

While Manager Mickey Cochrane lay critically injured in a hospital, the Tigers never had a change against either the southpaw slants of Gomez or the heavy-hitting artillery of the Yankees.
