NEW YORK, Oct. 16—One of the most important pieces of news this morning is that Italy has agreed to a partial withdrawal of troops from Spain. This news comes from London and follows a speech by Foreign Secretary Eden warning Italy that Great Britain would fight for the life line of the Empire. The London market is not open today. The Amsterdam market is slightly easier with American stocks below New York parity levels. The federal reserve board met yesterday but no special news came from this meeting. We would expect an irregular lower opening and would be guided this morning by volume. A rally in small volume later in the morning would not be very encouraging factor. A rally in large volume would be favorable.
