The Lausanne Conference

By George Hambleton Canadian Press Staff Writer LAUSANNE, July 1.—(Canadian Press Cable)—With his ups and downs, the Lausanne Conference still moves slowly forward to a settlement of the reparations question, but vital issues remain to be solved. Except for an early interview between Chancellor Franz Von Papen of Germany and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Britain, the Germans did not participate directly in today's discussions.

The special reparations committee has drafted the framework of a plan, but it is only a framework, leaving many blanks to be filled. Many features of the proposal for bonds which it is suggested Germany should issue when her credit is restored, as a contribution to a fund for the general restoration of Europe and in lieu of reparations annuities, remain to be determined.

The Germans strongly object to linking up American war debts with any final settlement of reparations. They want reparations cancelled without any strings attached. Yet American war debts are necessarily part of the ultimate picture and the French are insistent that a safeguard clause should be inserted guarding against failure to reach an agreement with the United States.

The reparations committee continues its work tomorrow. Reports from Paris and Berlin indicate some nervousness in both Germany and France over the situation.

On Brief Visit To The Province

Hon. Vincent Massey, former Canadian Ambassador to Washington and High Commissioner to London, who arrived in the Province Thursday, accompanied by Mrs. Massey and their two sons, left for the mainland yesterday morning after a brief tour of the Island.

During his holiday in the Maritimes, Mr. Massey, who is an outstanding figure in educational and diplomatic circles, filled speaking engagements before various clubs and organizations. A graduate of Toronto University, and of Oxford, Mr. Massey was for some years connected with the staff of the first named institution. He served as chairman of the National Patriation Commission after the Great War, and was a member of the Cabinet under the King Administration, prior to his appointment to the position of Canadian ambassador to Washington, and later to the position of Canadian High Commissioner to London.

The latter office he held till the appointment of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson to that position. Always an apostle of culture, Mr. Massey, it is interesting to note, is the founder of the Hart House String Quartette, which gave a concert in the City this spring.

French Tariff On Can. Wheat

(Canadian Press Cable) PARIS, July 1.—Under a bill submitted to the Chamber of Deputies by the Minister of Agriculture today the minimum tariff will be applied to Canadian wheat shipped to France before June 17, including wheat that has been stored. This is following the policy of exempting such Canadian wheat from the handicaps exposed by the expiration of the Franco-Canadian trade treaty recently. It was stated a week ago the expected bill would grant the minimum tariff only on wheat which left the Dominion before the expiry of the treaty at midnight June 16.
