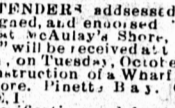

—CATTLE OVERBOARD.—While the cattle were being loaded aboard the Morwenna at Summerside on Monday night last, two of them went over the wharf into the dock and with considerable difficulty were raised to the wharf by the derrick of the ferry boat Bedoune, the engineer of which was aboard. Because of the darkness their falling overboard was not noticed by the owners or those working aboard the steamer, and only for the prompt act of a citizen in calling the owners, their loss would not have been noticed until it was too late to save them, owing to there being no electric light on the wharf (it having been cut out a few months ago) the town council having refused to pay for the lighting. The wharf at night is really dangerous, more so on a night such as Monday, and now that the busy season is coming on, the town authorities should arrange to have this public thoroughfare well lighted, especially on a night when a steamer is at the wharf.—J.
