Giants Hit Five Home Runs In Fourth Inning In Defeating Reds 17-3

NEW YORK, June 6—(AP)—New York Giants, booted heartily yesterday, reached baseball heights today in setting one Major League home run record and equalling another, as they smashed the first-place Cincinnati Reds under by a 17-3 in their most vicious attack of the year.

The new record came in the fourth inning when five Giants—Harry Danning, Frank Demaree, Burgess Whitehead, Manuel Salvo and Joe Moore hit for the circuit.

The record for seven homers in one game—before that big fourth inning Joe Moore and Mel Ott had connected for four base blows.

The record held jointly by the Detroit (National League) Club of 1886, Philadelphia Athletics of 1921 and Pittsburgh Pirates of 1894.

Rookie Eddie Miller's two-play error paved the way for St. Louis Cardinals' 10-inning victory over Boston Bees 5-3.

That highly polished shortstop allowed the Cards to fill the bases in the 10th by fumbling pitcher Curt Davis' grounder and then his wild throw to first opened the game for Don Gutteridge to cross with the winning run.

Until the extra frame, the game was a keen duel between Davis and Lefty Milburn Shortner.

Brooklyn Dodgers stopped into the first division with a 5-2 triumph over Pittsburgh Pirates for two victories out of the three-game series.

It was their 10th victory in 13 starts and moved them into a three-way deadlock for third place.

Fred Fitzsimmons went the route for his 17th win of the season. Pinky Whitney's pinch hit off Larry French scored George Scharein in the ninth inning to give the Phillies a 9-8 victory over Chicago Cubs.

Behind 8-6 going into the ninth, the Phillies hit Gene Lillard and Jack Russell for four successive singles for two runs to tie the score.

Waite fanned them, but Whitney followed with his single over second.

Owner Samuel D. Riddle announced through William Whaley, manager of his Glenview Farms, that the names of 1937 three-year-olds would be retired to the stud "within the next few days."

Whaley said the Admiral had not rounded into form at Belmont Park after treatment for a rheumatic ailment. He will be shipped to Maryland shortly, ending the racing career of the gallant little son of Man o' War.

Seek Olympic Winter Games For Montreal

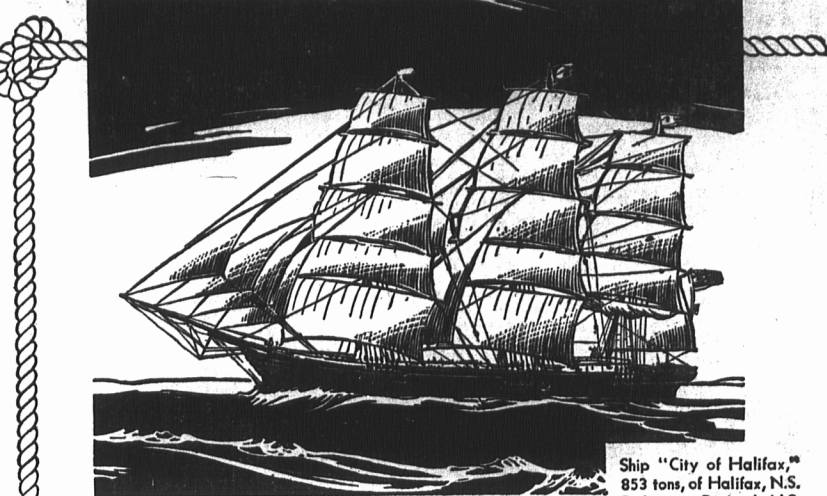
LONDON, June 6—(CP)—Canadian delegates today mapped their campaign to bring the winter Games of the 13th Olympiad to Montreal as the International Olympic Committee met to decide the locale of the 1944 contests.

The three Canadian delegates based their hopes upon the probable acceptance of London's bid for the summer program, reasoning that allocation of the winter games to Montreal would make 1944 an Empire year.

"Our chances more or less hinge on Britain getting the summer games for they are supporting us," William J. Northey, Montreal adviser to the Canadian Committee, said.

The Canadians argue also that Montreal is better equipped to handle the winter program than Oslo and Cortina d'Ampezzo in the Italian Alps, the other cities bidding.

The British press already has conceded the 1944 Olympics to London although Rome, Athens and Lausanne, Switzerland, have asked for the summer games.

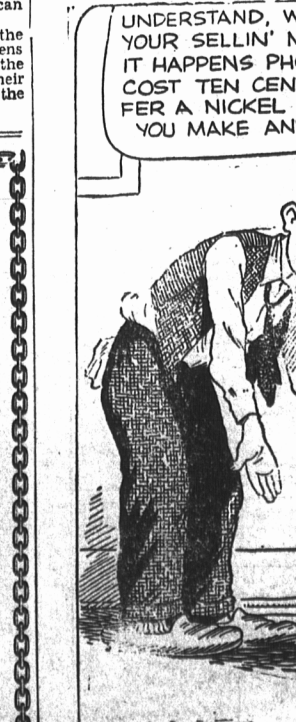

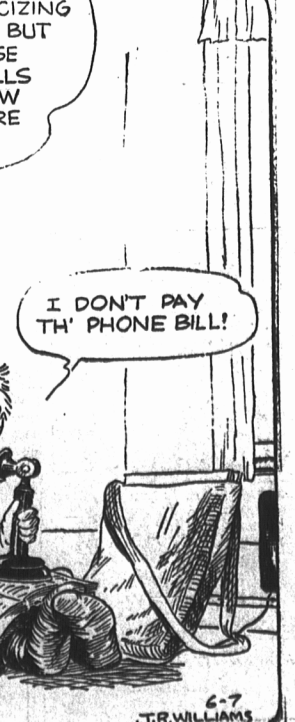
