The Liberal Leader In Summerside

Hon. McKenzie King, with his private Secretary, Mr. McGregor, arrived in Summerside by the evening train last night. He was met at the station by Messrs. LeRoy Holman, William Phillips and A. C. Leach, a delegation from Summerside. At luncheon they were joined by Premier Bell and proceeded to Summerside. After supper at the Clifton Hotel, they proceeded to St. Paul's Hall where an interview with the delegates from various parts of the constituency took place. There was a large representation of delegates and electors—about 300 in all.

Premier Bell presided and after a few minutes remarks opened the meeting and called upon Hon. Mr. King.

In his address Mr. King thanked personally the electors of Prince George by electing him by acclamation first the Liberals, secondly the Conservatives, who united with the Liberals in electing him by acclamation. Under the conditions he considered himself a representative of the whole country and not as representative of one party only.

Hon. J. H. Snelair, M. P., for Queens County, made a short address. He emphasized the advantages derived from free trade and reciprocity in this country. The different delegations were then called upon.

is ever to be what it should be we must stop all the leaks in the different branches. Every farmer in the province should be a Dairyman. Every cheese and buttermaker should interest himself in the individual dairymen and get him to keep records of his cows and every one boost the Dairy business in the coming year.

The above report was unanimously adopted.

The President then called upon Hon. W. M. Lea, Secretary of Agriculture congratulating him upon the honorable position he has been called upon to occupy since the last meeting.

Hon. UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT NOT REPRESENTED

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—President Wilson today issued a call for the first meeting of the Council of the League of Nations, to be held at Paris at 10.30 p. m. Friday. It was directed to the Ambassadors of the Entente Nations which have become a party to the Exchange of ratifications of the Treaty of Versailles and will not be made public until it has been transmitted by them to their Governments. The call which was very brief was issued by the President in accordance with the terms of the Treaty. The United States will not be represented at the meeting of the council which is expected to provide for the settling up of a number of commissions, immediate creation of which is carry out certain provisions of the Treaty is mandatory.

The case was argued at considerable length at the last term of the Supreme Court by Mr. Warburton in support of the rule and Mr. Bentley against it.

The judgment of the full Court delivered this morning, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald granted the certiorari, the Court holding that the "possession" referred to in the Prohibition Act is not to be considered as being retroactive so as to include liquors lawfully acquired before the Act and not kept for an unlawful purpose will be set aside.

Meeting of the Stock Breeders

A meeting of the P. E. Island Stock Breeders Association was held in the Prince of Wales Hotel last night. The President, Mr. W. W. Crosby, Cornwall, occupied the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Mr. G. Guthrie delivered a short address in which he commended the organization as a means through which the interests of stock breeding could be forwarded. He also spoke of the splendid work being done by Island breeders along various lines of the live stock industry, and thought that auction sales in this province held in central places at which our best stock could be sold would be a feature of considerable value. In view of the Maritime show at Amherst, at which Island stock was being sold, he considered it would not be advisable to hold a provincial show in this province.

Hon. W. M. Lea, Commissioner of Agriculture, was the next speaker. His address was along the lines of the importance of live stock as a basis of our prosperity. In the course of his address he gave some good pointers on breeding and grading up of our flocks and herds as well as the selection of improved sires.

Mr. J. J. King, of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, spoke for some time on the marketing of live stock with a special reference to lambs. Mr. King outlined the system of marketing followed in New Brunswick during the past season and submitted figures showing the cost of handling, shrinkage during transportation, and the prices received by the producers.
