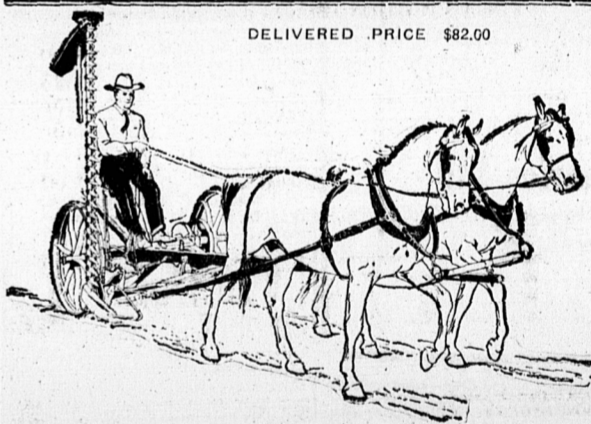
TOBACCO FOR ALL "PEN" PRISONERS Government Regulations Changed to Permit Convicts to Have the "Weed."

Department of Justice were put through the House last session. A provision was made in them for money for the purchase of tobacco for convicts in all Canadian penitentiaries who had been in the habit of using the weed previous to their incarceration.

OTTAWA, July 5.—Prisoners in Portmouth penitentiary at Kingston are not the only ones to be allowed the use of tobacco this year. When the estimates of the

Department of Justice were put through the House last session. A provision was made in them for money for the purchase of tobacco for convicts in all Canadian penitentiaries who had been in the habit of using the weed previous to their incarceration. The use of tobacco in penitentiaries was cut off in the time of Sir Oliver Mowat, 24 years ago, and from then until very recently none of the convicts have been allowed the solace of a puff at pipe or cigarette.

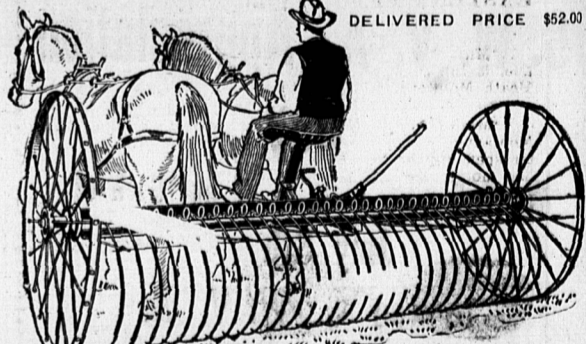

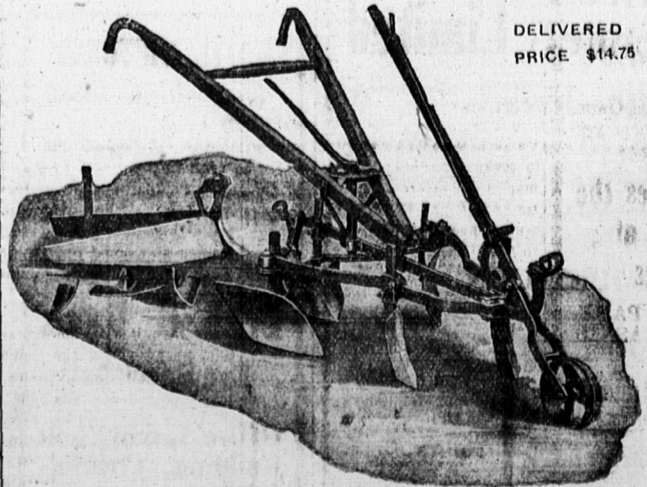
