POPULATION OF RUSSIA ALMOST IN STATE OF PANIC

Intense Alarm at St. Petersburg—Communication With the Outside World Has Ceased—Rumor of Attempted Assassination of the Emperor—Situation Very Grave in the Baltic Provinces—Guard for the American Embassy.

St. Petersburg, via Berlin, Dec. 3.—(Special)—Intense alarm prevails here. Communication with the outside world ceased this morning when the Finnish telegraph operators joined their Russian comrades.

St. Petersburg daily. KIEV, Russia, Dec. 4.—(Special)—There has been serious street fighting between the mutineers, soldiers and Cossacks and scores of persons have been killed or wounded.

MOB HOOTED PRINCESS LOUISE

A REDUCTION IN ESTIMATES

British Admiralty Will Lessen Grant For Navy By Seven and Half Millions in Addition to That of Last Year—Four New Cruisers Each Year.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—(Special)—An official memorandum issued by the Admiralty states that as the result of the recent reforms the next estimates for the Navy will show a reduction of seven and a half million dollars in addition to the reduction of the seventeen million made last spring.

The Admiralty considers that the present strategic requirements will necessitate the building of at least four large armored cruisers annually.

LOSING ITS POPULATION

St. John's Nfld., Dec. 1. There is alarm among the authorities of St. Pierre, Miq at the extent to which emigration from the colony has grown. Over 1,000 persons of a total population of 6,500 have left there within the past three months.

FEARED ISLAND MAN MURDERED

BOSTON, Dec. 1.—Investigation is being made into the death of Roland Meikle, late of Charlottetown, who was said to have committed suicide. The only one present at the time was deceased's fourteen year old son.

ATTORNEY JEROME ATTACKS JUDGES

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—District Attorney Jerome's arraignment of the Supreme Court Justices of this district has stirred the city. Mr. Jerome made his attack on the Justices on the Supreme Bench in a speech at a political independence dinner of the City Club last night.

DOCTORS WANT RECIPROCITY

LONDON, Dec. 1.—At a meeting of the General Medical Council the president said that the effect of the Medical Act amendment of 1905 was that the [provinces of Canada, previously debarred, might apply on their own behalf for admission to the privileges of medical reciprocity with the United Kingdom.
