Crop Report

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 31—A general rain over most of the prairie area on August 24th and 25th has delayed the harvest for two or three days, but it now seems to be in full swing again. Southern Manitoba reports cutting nearly completed and this percentage decreases as you go west and north across the prairie till Central Alberta is reached. Here cutting will not be general for another week. Results of the harvest are about average in southern Manitoba and the grades are good. Saskatchewan yields are just about the long time average with the grades being a bit low, and in Alberta the harvest is not far enough advanced to make any accurate estimates. Labor supplies appear adequate at all points. Machinery supplies and repairs are causing concern in some localities according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Weekly Livestock Market

SUMMARY
 (Ottawa, August 30)
 Moderate cattle runs were taken in western markets at steady to stronger prices. Winnipeg gave the best display of strength, advancing 50 cents, while other centres were at least steady to 25 cents higher. In the east there was little change in prices from the previous week, although the tendency was stronger. Lamb marketings, increasing seasonally, brought about a reduction of 50 cents at principal markets. Other live stock sold generally unchanged.

Eastern Cattle Markets
 After opening slow, more activity developed at TORONTO and cattle prices finished firm to a shade higher on the better grades. The run was the heaviest so far this year and saw weighty steers disposed of at \$12.75 for good kinds, with some small lots at \$14, and good butcher steers and heifers at \$12.25 to \$12.50, with an occasional \$12.75. The price of stockers was fairly good at steady prices, with fair to good, 600-lb. steers making up to \$10.75. Butcher cows up to \$10, with good western run \$9 to \$9.75 and the better grade of stockers and fedders at \$9.75 to \$11. The price of calves increased up to 25 cents or more, and the price of hogs advanced for steers but mostly \$1.75 to \$12.50. EDMONTON up to \$12.50. PRINCE ALBERT up to \$12.50. SASKATOON \$11 to \$12.25. VANCOUVER \$12.10 to \$12.75.

Guide To Britain's New Towns

heat can be most efficiently supplied by "district heating" (that is hot water laid on along the streets) not only for industry but even for domestic areas with only ten houses per acre. The water supply should aim at supplying 50 gallons daily per head. The Committee's suggestions for road systems follow the most modern schemes for radial and ring roads, separate cycle tracks, limited access of local traffic to main roads, etc. Each new town should have an adequate internal bus service and for longer journeys there should be a central bus station near the railway station which itself should be "an outstanding feature of the town, externally and internally. Each town should also have reasonable access to air facilities.

On social life and recreation the report says due regard must be paid to the growing interest in theatre, music and other arts among all classes. At least one public library will be required which could house the nucleus of a local museum. In hotels "new towns should seek to revive all that is best in traditional British hospitality while enriching it with much that other countries have to teach about the art of good living." Finally, in recommending open spaces at not less than one acre per thousand the Committee makes a special plea for the children's need to make their own amusements. Besides the traditional swings and seesaws, the designer should provide a large or two, a tunnel, some guard tree stumps with ample foot-holds, and some dwarf walls for playing houses.

Exports to United States

Shipments of dairy cattle to the United States totalled 1315 for the week, as compared with 932 in the same week a year ago. Exports for the first six months of this year amount to 44,600 head; and in the corresponding period of 1945 were 31,298.

Calf Market Steady

Only minor changes occurred in prices paid for calves during the week, Toronto continuing at \$12.50 to \$14.50 and an odd \$15, Winnipeg at \$12.50 to \$14.50, and \$12.50 to \$13.50. Regina up to \$13, and Vancouver \$12 to \$13.

Slight Change in Hog Prices

The trend of the hog market was steady, Toronto was up 25 cents with \$1 hogs \$21.35, while Montreal was up 10 cents to \$19.10. Winnipeg was down 25 cents, with \$1 hogs at \$19.60, Prince Albert \$18.85, Moose Jaw and Regina \$18.85, Saskatoon \$18.75 to \$18.85, and Vancouver \$18.75 to \$18.85, and Regina up to \$14.
