PORTUGUESE GOVERNMENT NIPS REVOLTS

MUTINY ON NAVAL VESSELS SUPPRESSED

Spanish Rebels Turn Down Offer By The Governor Of San Sebastian To Surrender City.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) After turning down an offer by the Governor of San Sebastian to surrender the city, Spanish rebels pressed steadily toward the Bay of Biscay coast Tuesday night. Six French seaplanes patrolled the Franco-Spanish border after a bomb had fallen on Hendaye Beach.

The rebels announced the capture of Pasajes and a rebel broadcast also claimed the capture of Renieria, south of Pasajes but almost equidistant from San Sebastian.

The Madrid Government announced a new drive against Orleas in the northwest. A mutiny on two warships in the Tagus at Lisbon, Portugal, was quickly suppressed. A state of alarm was declared in the city. The Portugal capital remained calm, however, reports said. Six men were killed and nine wounded on the mutinous ships by the fire of shore batteries.

The international committee for co-ordination of neutrality measures in the Spanish war was scheduled to hold its first meeting in London Wednesday.

In the face of Communist demands for aid for Spanish leftists, Premier Blum of France was reported considering calling a special session of the Chamber of Deputies to obtain a vote of confidence on the cabinet's neutrality stand.

UNDER MILITARY CONTROL

LISBON, Portugal, Sept. 8.—The Government clamped military control on Lisbon tonight after quick-ripping revolts on two naval vessels in the Tagus river harbor off Lisbon.

The capital itself was calm as was the countryside, reports said. Six mutinous members of the crews were killed and nine injured before the Government by prompt action disabled the vessels and beached them, arresting their

Soviet Press Warns Spectre Of War Looms Nearer; Nazis Gather At Nuremberg

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, Sept. 8.—Warnings that "the spectre of war is approaching nearer and nearer" resounded in the Soviet press tonight as the Red Army moved midway between Berlin and Moscow in manoeuvres along the Polish frontier.

"The German city of Nuremberg tonight was plastered with placards terming Bolshevism "world enemy No. 1." Hundreds of thousands of Nazis were assembled in the city for their annual party convention.

While two of the three army divisions at Minsk were working out frontier strategy, the Moscow press boasted the Soviets were able to protect the Fatherland.

The Pravda said: "The ominous spectre of war is approaching nearer and nearer. The danger is too real for one to confine it to resolutions and oral demonstrations. One must fight actively for peace."

Nuremberg En Fete

NUREMBERG, Germany, Sept. 8.—Chancellor Hitler tonight proclaimed he had restored "full arms sovereignty" to the German nation during the last year.

Hitler's assertion was contained in a three-minute speech made before hundreds of thousands of cheering Nazis gathered in Nuremberg for their annual party convention.

Said Hitler today, during brief ceremonies at the city hall where he was presented with a four-century-old drawing of Nuremberg: "This gift, with its banners for the city's ramparts and defences, reminds me of this most difficult period in my life—when, in the past

CANADIAN DELEGATES TO LEAGUE NAMED

Premier King, Hon. Raoul Dandurand, and Labor Minister Rogers Official Representatives.

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Hon. Raoul Dandurand, government leader in the Senate, and Labor Minister Norman Rogers will be Canada's official delegates to the forthcoming session of the League of Nations. Dr. O. D. Skelton, under-secretary for external affairs and Dr. W. A. Riddell permanent advisory officer at Geneva, will be alternate delegates.

In making this announcement tonight the Prime Minister said that because of the importance of this League session, and the great responsibility attaching to anything that may be said there, he had decided against having any delegates other than those responsible for the government or its administration.

Col. G. P. Vanier, a member of the staff of the Canadian High Commissioner in London, will accompany the party to Geneva as expert adviser.

Resume Search For Fliers

EDMONTON, Sept. 8.—Five weather today allowed resumption of the search for flight lieutenant Sheldon Coleman and aircraftman J. Pory, missing for 23 days in the barren lands north of Fort Reliance in the Northwest Territories, 800 miles north of here.

Low ceiling, clouds and rain had kept the five R. C. A. F. and one Canadian airways airplanes grounded yesterday, losing another precious day in the desperate drive to find the airmen before the freeze-up, expected toward the end of this month.

Bringing the total number of reinforcements during the past six days to five, Flight-Lieutenant Aranson, R. C. A. F., Winnipeg, arrived by train and left for the north. He will remain at Waterways, Alta., 300 miles north of here, for a few days arranging shipments of gasoline by boat to Fort Reliance to enable the search to be carried on this winter if necessary.

Plan Redemption Of Scrip Money Issue

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CALGARY, Sept. 8.—There will be enough money on hand to redeem all the Alberta prosperity certificates and this will remove any lack of confidence in them, said Hon. W. A. Fallow, Minister of Public Works, in an interview here today.

For three days this week, starting Sept. 10, the government will redeem certificates for cash to wholesalers, retailers and others who have accounts to meet outside Alberta. Mr. Fallow will supervise arrangements for redemption.

Prosperity certificates were first issued August 1 to the amount of \$250,000 to pay wages of roadworkers recruited from the ranks of the unemployed.

The issue of certificates has done what was expected of it, the minister stated. It had given work and wages to those who needed it.

King Edward Visits Specialist

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) VIENNA, Sept. 8.—King Edward visited an eye, ear and nose specialist today, but a member of his party said he was in no wise ailing.

It was said his visit to Dr. Heinrich Neumann was prompted by friendship and a desire to learn if any ill effects had followed a slight cold.

King Edward visited Dr. Neumann last September and was treated for an inflammation of the inner ear.

Earlier the King had democratically invited his chauffeur and accompanying detectives to join him in a Turkish bath.

NEW NATIONAL HARBORSBOARD APPOINTED

Ralph Campney, Vancouver, Will Head Three-man Board With Salaries Of \$10,000.

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Completing a move initiated soon after taking office last October, the Government today appointed a permanent national harbors board which will have jurisdiction over principal Canadian ports in place of the individual harbor commissions formerly existing.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced tonight that Ralph Campney, one-time member of his own secretarial staff and now a lawyer in Vancouver, has been named chairman of the board. Col. A. E. Dubuc, chief engineer of the department of railways and canals, and B. J. Roberts, assistant deputy minister of finance, were named members of the three-man board.

A provisional board was set up last fall and immediately took over jurisdiction of the ports of Halifax, Saint John, Chicoutimi, Que., Three Rivers, Montreal and Vancouver. The harbor commissions existing at those ports were abolished and replaced by local managers.

H. E. A. Hawken assistant deputy minister of marine, with Col. Dubuc and Mr. Roberts, carried on as the provisional board but Mr. Hawken died suddenly a few weeks ago. The two board members will now be relieved of their other duties and devote full time to administration of national port facilities.

All three members will receive full salaries of \$10,000. Mr. Campney will be chairman and representative of Western Canada, Col. Dubuc, a native of Montreal, vice chairman and representative of central Canada, and Mr. Roberts has a Maritime background. The work will be divided on the broad lines of engineering, finance and general administration.

Pioneer Rancher Was Native Of Province

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NANTON, Alta., Sept. 8.—Pioneer rancher who came West by prairie schooner from Charlottetown in 1882, Fred Ings, 74, died today in this southern Alberta town.

Son of John Ings, prominent Charlottetown banker, ship-owner and publisher, Mr. Ings during the Riel Rebellion rode the range to protect his cattle from the depredations of Indians.

Col. Ernest Ings of Charlottetown, is a brother.

Princess Juliana To Wed German Prince

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands, Sept. 8.—Princess Juliana, heiress to the throne of the Netherlands, and the German Prince Bernhard Zuplisse-Biesterfeld are to be Europe's next royal bridal pair.

Their engagement, as unexpected as it was joyously received by the populace, was announced today. No date was set for the ceremonies.

Youths Narrowly Escape In Second Moose River Cave-in

MOOSE RIVER, N. S., Sept. 8.—A second Moose River gold mine cave-in occurred today and almost engulfing four youths walking along a road 600 yards from the shaft which collapsed last April, imprisoning Dr. D. E. Robertson and Alfred Scadding for 10 days and causing the death of Herman Magill.

Today's cave-in left a gaping pit 100 feet deep, Lawrence Higgins, Rose Higgins, Harry Horne and Charlie Cox were within five feet of the spot where the land collapsed and felt the ground shake under their feet.

Tragedies Occur On Mainland

Eugene Blanchard Crushed Under Freight Train Near Wolfville N. S. Edwin Paquet Drowned Near McAdam N. B.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MCADAM, N. B., Sept. 8.—Edwin Paquet, 18, Charlottetown, P. E. I., was drowned this evening while attempting to swim across the St. Croix River near here. His companion, Lawrence Peters, 19, also from Prince Edward Island, made a valiant but futile attempt at rescue.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Sept. 8.—Crushed under the wheels of a freight train, Eugene Blanchard, 22-year-old Charlottetown youth, was fatally injured today a few hours after he had found a long-sought job.

Blanchard and a companion from the Island capital, Robert Carson, were boarding the Dominion Atlantic Railway westbound train when the accident occurred.

After several days of wandering about the Annapolis Valley in search of work, they had obtained employment at Greenwich and were to start picking apples tomorrow. Having left their luggage here, they returned today to get it.

Leaves Balance

Leaping on the moving train, Blanchard reached a platform in the middle of a string of cars. Then he lost his balance and fell to the track below. Three wheels passed over his body while Carson was shouting to trainmen for assistance.

With one leg severed at the ankle, knee and thigh, the youth lived only a few seconds after the train stopped.

"Take me to a hospital quick," he implored his companion, then fell back dead.

Deeply grieved, Carson said later that Blanchard had poor eyesight and wore glasses. He thought the unfortunate youth's foot must have slipped on the coupling between two cars. Carson added that Blanchard was the fifth person he had seen killed in the last four years during his rail-riding in the United States and Canada.

Inquest Adjourned

Dr. G. R. Forbes, Kentville coroner, was notified and had the body removed to Woodman and Company's undertaking parlor. Chief of Police Crowell empaneled a jury and the inquest was adjourned until tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock when members of the train crew will be present as witnesses.

Quebec Legislature May Meet Oct. 6

QUEBEC, Sept. 8.—Premier Maurice Duplessis and his Union Nationale cabinet will submit to Lieut.-Governor E. L. Patenaude tomorrow the opening date for the legislature session which will see Liberals in the opposition benches for the first time in forty years.

Reports in political circles tonight pointed to Oct. 6 as the likely date for the seating of Premier Duplessis and his 75 followers who swept the province in the Aug. 17 election. A handful of 14 Liberals will be to the left of the speaker.

After pressing legislation is dealt with by Premier Duplessis and his Union Nationale government in a short session it is believed the House will adjourn until next January.

Premier Baldwin Extends Holiday

Martial Law For Palestine

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Sept. 8.—Prepared to declare martial law in Palestine if necessary to end Arab-Jewish disorders which have continued for nearly six months, Lieutenant-General J. G. Dill, newly appointed commander-in-chief of British troops in the Holy Land, left today for Marseille, whence he will sail to Haifa on the destroyer Douglas.

Before leaving he gave his approval to plans for the transportation of 15,000 troops who will follow him shore, doubling the British military force in Palestine.
