THE Stanley leaves this morning on the busy service.

THE City of London leaves at 10 this morning for Vernon River.

THE Princess arrived Saturday evening at 8.45 and the express at 11.25.

Owing to repairs being made to the organ in St. James Church yesterday the service was held in the Hall.

THE City of London will make a special trip up East River early this (Monday) morning for a load of potatoes comprising 160 bushels.

THE firemen were called out Saturday evening for a slight blaze in the barn of the late Donald Farquharson, Prince Street, which was soon extinguished.

LODGES Prince Edward and Eton S.O.E. will hold their annual church parade on Sunday 22nd. They will attend Divine Service at St. Paul's Church.

THE cargo of the City of London Saturday morning included 25 hogs, 20 cases eggs, 50 oil casks, two cows, one horse. She took general merchandise on return in the afternoon.

THE Treasurer of the P. E. Island Auxiliary Bible Society acknowledges with thanks the receipt of \$25.00 per Hon. Peter McNutt, a donation by the Presbyterian Church of Malpeque.

THE pulpit of St. Paul's Church was occupied last night by Rev. R. W. Grant, M. A., Rector of Christ Church, Gardiner, Me., who is visiting in the city the guest of G. W. and Mrs. Lengworth. The music was excellent at both the services and the sermon a remarkably able effort.

A MEETING of those willing to take stock in the Hotel Davies for which an offer of \$20,500 was accepted Saturday, was held in the office of Peter, Peters & Ings, Saturday night. The question of the hotel was discussed at length and about \$18,000 was subscribed by those present. A committee was appointed to solicit for the remainder. It is understood that an offer \$1000 in advance of the present one, was made recently.

A LARGE gaping hole greeted the spectators at the east end of the railway station Saturday afternoon. Mr. Pratt proceeded as far west as Vancouver where he remained several days and then returned to Calgary in which city he remained for some time. When passing through the country west of Winnipeg, Mr. Pratt found many places partly submerged from the recent heavy rains. This will make the spring work much later than it usually is. Though impressed with the immensity of the resources of the prairie Mr. Pratt preferred Vancouver to any of the Canadian cities, outside of the Garden of the Gulf.
