GUY ANN SETS NEW TWO-YEAR OLD RECORD

Exciting Finishes Feature Second Day's Racing

Guy Ann Sets New Mark Of 2.24 1/4. Hi-Socks, I'm Alone, Abner T. Clegg And Peggy Longset Are Winners Of Respective Classes.

Yesterday's racing at the Big Fair was nothing short of sensational in many respects. In the Two-Year-Old Trot and Pace Hi Socks and Guy Ann respectively lowered the Provincial two-year-old record three trips, the former twice and the latter finally in a crowning achievement, placing it at 2:24 1/4 for a new Maritime record. In setting the new mark Guy Ann clipped 3/4 of a second off the record made by Joe the Great, a two year old owned by F. C. McCurdy, Truro, N. S., racing in the three year old class six years ago, driving the mile in 2:24 1/4.

Close Finishes
The first and second heats of the 215 Trot and Pace in which I'm Alone and Patrick Direct were winners respectively by noses, and the sensational drive of the fifteen-year-old Baxter Boy behind Maxine Great in the third heat of that race, will be standouts and talked about racing recollections for a long time. At the three-quarter pole Maxine Great was several lengths back in third horse position, then the young driver started to call on her and she crept up a little closer entering the stretch. From there on she seemed to fairly fly, ending up I'm Alone finally collaring Patrick Direct a few yards from the wire and winning by a neck. The Grand Stand simply went wild and the fifteen-year-old boy was called back to receive an ovation.

A few years ago this mare was bought in the United States for a figure said to be \$2,500 and was accidentally injured when unloaded. Her career for the next few years on the race track was most disappointing and she passed into the hands of Fergie Baxter, who found that a nerve had been injured, had the nerve removed by an operation and now Maxine Great, with Baxter Jr. at the helm, is a real racing machine.

Clegg Makes Sweep

The 218 Trot and Pace was known to be a rivalry contest between the two Halifax pacers, Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2, recently brought from Pennsylvania, and Star G. 2:09. The stand sensing this rivalry were right on their tip toes for what would follow. After a little jockeying they got away good, Signal Senator getting the pace and holding on grimly until well down in the home stretch. Then the Clegg horse came through but right on his wheels was Star G. and the battle for the next hundred yards was a terrific one. Twenty yards from the wire Star G. was leading and seemed good by Driver Keyes as he stepped between them and the Clegg horse's head showed in front.

The next two heats were lively, but Clegg had the advantage and won. He is owned by the Merrytime Stables, Halifax.

The 225 Trot Maritime Bred brought out eight starters, nearly all good mannered and good gaited, Peggy Longset 2:17, who has been showing up so well for Frank Calbeck, Summerside, won in straight heats but every heat was a battle and Frank was a busy man warding off the others.

The racing would have been over at about five o'clock but for the extra heat required to complete the 215 Pace. The whole program was hustled along in good shape and the drivers co-operated. The starting was also good and the whole afternoon's sport thoroughly enjoyed.

Vaudeville

The vaudeville program was the same as the previous day except

70,000 See Old Country Soccer Match

GLASGOW, Scotland, Aug. 21.—Seventy thousand spectators saw Scotland defeat England 4-2 today in an "all-pay" international soccer match at Hampden Park. The proceeds of the game will be devoted to the King's Jubilee Cancer Fund. All persons, including representatives of the Scottish Football Association and a large corps of sports writers, were required to pay ton admission to the spacious enclosure of the Queen's Park Club.

Delaney, Armstrong and Walker gave the Scots a 3-0 lead at half-time. Walker added another after the resumption, but the margin was reduced by Gurney and Westwood in the closing minutes of the game. Only in the last 10 minutes did the English players touch international form.

Two-Year-Old Trot and Pace

First heat.—Hi Socks got away at the pole on the third score and paced like a machine from wire to wire, his driver, Mac Steele, seemingly making no effort to hustle him along. Miss Victoria who had got away in fifth position gradually moved up to second and finished at Hi Socks' wheel, Guy Ann a close third and Starrett Volo fourth, Reymonette fifth.

Second Heat.—Hi Socks had the pole and seemed to move very comfortably throughout the mile, although pushed by Miss Victoria until well into the stretch, then Guy Ann with driver George Callbeck up, seemed to come on from lengths behind. Another twenty feet and she would have topped the heat. That was how close it was. Miss Victoria was a good third and Reymonette a good fourth.

In the third heat Hi Socks was in the lead until the second time around into the back stretch, then Guy Ann went out in front, her driver hustling her along and when she hit the stretch stepping on the gas. She seemed to finish very fast and when the time was announced it was found that it was the fastest of the race, 2:24 1/4, a new Maritime record.

215 Trot and Pace

This was a very interesting race to watch, good clean driving and close finishes. At first Patrick Direct and I'm Alone made a ripping fight of it, King Spruce and Maxine Great also figuring. Patrick Direct put on a sprint about fifty yards from the wire and won by a neck from I'm Alone; King Spruce third, Maxine Great fourth.

In the second heat they got away well down in the home stretch. Direct trailing, King Spruce third and Maxine Great fourth. Near the three-quarter pole Maxine Great passed King Spruce, then Patrick Direct pulled out on even terms with I'm Alone. The race between these three was a good one and they all finished very close.

218 Trot and Pace

This was a very interesting race because most of the horses were Prince Edward Island bred, three being the get of Longset. They were good mannered and got away well. The fourth score, Peter S. Mae West got away on a break and was regrettably distanced. Peggy Longset soon got out in the clear and with driver Frank Calbeck sitting snugly up to cut out the wind resistance, went serenely on her way to victory, but not without some misgivings as Happy Boy, Star Dillon and Peter S. took up the battle outside. Peter S. went a ripping heat, finishing a close second. Star Dillon third and Nancy Sue a close fourth. Happy Boy, who looked good for two-thirds of the journey, fifth.

Greyhound Trots Mile In Two Flat

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 21.—Greyhound, winner of the Hambletonian, set a new world's record for three-year-old geldings in trotting a two-minute mile today to win the feature event on the Illinois State Fair program.

Greyhound, owned by the Baker Stables of St. Charles, Ill., and driven by Sep Palin of Indianapolis, easily took the first heat of the three-year-old trot in 2:05, finishing a length ahead without difficulty. Palin turned the horse loose in the second heat, coming in well ahead in two minutes.

Second place in both heats went to the Saint, also owned by the Baker Stables.
