IMPRESSIVE SERVICE MARKS OBSEQUIES. (Riverside Exchange.) Marked by great beauty and dignity were the services which marked the burial of the late Rev. E. F. Goff, held Tuesday afternoon.

At the cemetery the prayer of commitment was given by Dr. Horace Porter, and preceding his prayer he read in a deeply impressive manner "Crossing the Bar" by Tennyson.

At the church, organ music was played by Mr. Butler, formerly head of the organ department at Pomona college. Mrs. La Roy Simms acted as accompanist for Miss Boardman.

Dr. Kingman in his sermon spoke as follows: "We meet here today in sadness. Not chiefly sadness, we look up, not down. We are here to give thanks to God for His loving kindness to this servant of His and for all the kindness of God that came to us through him. It is characteristic of him that he had asked that on this day there might be little eulogy."

"Wonderful in his life was the working out and demonstration into common, everyday life of these wonderful words of divine assurance. We gather here not to complain that a few more years were not given to him, but to thank him, for, by the kindness of God, his was a life of love, labor and glorious courage."

"The life of his Father saluted him at the very beginning of his life. In that home, with that father and mother, with those brothers and sisters, with those sacred influences moulding him to be what he was. And love followed him, for, by the love of God, the love of that companion inseparable for so many years. The love of all friends. Did ever a man have more devoted friends than he? The devotion of those who worked with him and knew him was his. And love followed him to the last day and hour. Surely kindness and mercy followed him all the days of his life."

"His life was lived in the sunshine of this love abundantly about him. And his life reflected the love. How actively he shed the sweetness and wholesome kindness of a loving, unselfish love to those who knew him. Those who knew him know how gen-

tle, how sunny and warm, how affectionate a heart was his, whether it was for little children or for those boys and girls who worked with him in the Inn. How he loved to minister.

"There was worked out in his life in common ways, the words of his Lord and Master, who went about doing good, and his life was rich in labor. Thirty years he had as a minister of God. Crowded years of intense activity; of a great joy of service. In the last 10 years when he might have earned much for himself in a material way, he gave himself to Pomona college. It was a life filled up to the last days with activity, with an intense application to those things that God gave him to do.

"He might have been a millionaire had he chosen. Mr. Goff had not thought for such things. He loved the quiet years that he might be free to serve man, and here we see the truth of God and the grace of God in common life and our own hearts take courage. His life was filled with a joyous patience that was undiminished. Courage that cannot be daunted. You here know how quiet and grave he met the trials of spirit that sometimes blanch men's faces and chill their hearts. And yet he went about with his accustomed kindness and cheeriness to his work and with such a dauntless courage that those who were his nearest friends did not know that such a shadow was pending. Then again the same trial came upon him in these latter years his life was lived in that more uncertainty, but I do not think that any man ever saw him cast down, ever heard him complain. A smile and welcome was always on his face. His spirit when it came to meeting his fellows and those who loved him was one of splendid self-possession. He was able to walk undimmed, unshamed and undaunted to the very last day and hour. And so we give thanks to God for him. Our own hearts take courage, and as we take farewell of him, we hear his message to us. To be true to our calling, to be fearless in our faith. And we take courage to believe that kindness and mercy shall follow us all the days of our life because we

have seen those divine words worked out in our common life. For him we give thanks to God."
