**EDUCATION. HOW POSSIBLE TO IMPROVE IT**

brought more in touch with the home life of the pupil. The people would see in the school more utility than many of them now do, and our young people would, under such a system, intelligently and judiciously be carried out, be directed towards not away from the farm.

The difficulty of carrying out a well graded system of school work is enhanced by the number of small schools scattered throughout the province. What is needed to make our system more effective is consolidation. The educational advantages of consolidation are admitted by all. In a sufficiently large, graded school, no pupil need be debarred from the study of any subject. In the larger school provision could be made for teaching Latin and Mathematics. The recommendation made for excluding these subjects from the curriculum, was only made for the small school where one teacher had to teach all the subjects to all the pupils. The objection to the consolidated school is solely on account of the cost. If that question could be satisfactorily solved there would not be any valid objection to consolidation. The advantages offered by consolidation may be urged as an offset to the increased cost. The largest item in the cost is that of transportation. The cost might be considerably reduced by co-operation amongst the people. There are several months in the winter, the season when farm work is not pressing, and horses not fully employed, the season also when the larger boys attend school. Could not the conveyance be driven by some trustworthy boy, thus lessening the cost during the summer months. There are other means of co-operation that could be worked out by the people if they entered heartily into the project of consolidation and wished it to succeed.

To aid in bringing about consolidation the government, as an inducement to districts to undertake this work, might offer a grant of a certain percentage on the amount raised for school purposes. "As is the teacher so is the school." Any system of education that does not make the preparation of the teacher the first consideration will fail to produce the best results. There is needed in this province a thoroughly equipped teachers' training department in connection with the Normal School, presided over by an expert. Before a teacher is licensed to teach he should have completed his training course.

In addition to the preparation received by the student teachers at the Normal School, there should be organized by the Education Department a system of teachers' institutes, conducted by the Inspector or Superintendent, and where actual school work would be done. These should be in addition to the teachers' association, which is a voluntary organization. Attendance at the institute meetings should be obligatory upon the teachers. None should receive licenses

to teach until they are at least twenty years of age. Equal salaries should be paid to male and female teachers.

The maintenance of a system of education costs money. The cry of the people and the government is "We have not the money." The people have it. The government has not. This is not a poverty-stricken province. The people are well able to maintain a good system of education. To retain our teachers better salaries must be paid, either by the people directly as a result of district assessment, or by the government as a result of direct taxation.

For the purpose of keeping up the roads of the Province a special tax is imposed and collected by the Government. If better results have been obtained by abolishing the old statute labor system and replacing it by direct taxation by the Government, would not the same result follow the imposing and collecting by the Government of a special educational tax? From this special educational fund would be paid teachers' salaries and other expenses coming under the direct control of the Government. There would still be the expense of providing school accommodation and in the case of consolidated schools the cost of conveyance to be raised by the districts.

In the Province of New Brunswick the Government is taking a considerable portion of the increased subsidy recently received from the Dominion to increase the statutory allowance to the teachers. In Nova Scotia the government is establishing technical schools throughout the Province and a magnificent Institute of Technology at Halifax with its increased subsidy. Might not the government of Prince Edward Island find in the cause of education an opportunity of expending a considerable portion of the \$70,000 additional subsidy with greater benefit to the Province than in any other direction in which it might be expended.

In these suggested improvements caution should be exercised in their introduction. Too much must not be attempted at once. The ground must be well prepared before attempting to make changes. Too violent or sudden changes are frequently followed by reaction which frequently gives a set back to the cause that is sought to be promoted. We need to consider well the step to be taken. Attempt to carry out the project by degrees, but be sure that we are facing right.
