At the meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening it was decided to lease the market hall to Messrs Silliphant and Gaudet to be used as a moving picture house at thirty dollars per month, the town reserving four nights per month for their use. Councillor Holman reported that the new scenery for the hall had arrived and he was instructed to have placed in position at once. A letter from the hospital committee was laid on the table for further consideration. Councillor Reid brought up the matter of the laying of concrete sidewalks on the south side of Water Street from Gourlay's corner to Queen Street, but no action was taken on the present, as the appropriation on streets for the present year is about all used up. Regarding the lighting of the streets leading to the exhibition grounds and also the buildings on the grounds the Council agreed to furnish the same amount of lighting as they furnished last year. A number of extra police were appointed for Friday and Saturday next, Exhibition days.

The death took place at Saskatoon, Sask., of typhoid fever on Friday last of Thomas J. Casely, aged 38 years, leaving a wife and one child. Deceased formerly a resident in Kensington and Clifton Western Canada about two years ago. The remains will be brought home for interment, of which further particulars for funeral will be given later.

BISHOP OF LONDON ADDRESSES HALIFAX CANADIAN CLUB

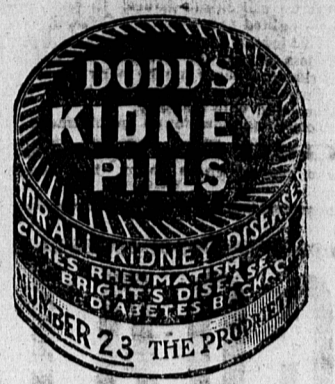
HALIFAX, Sept. 11.—The Bishop of London addressed the Canadian Club and one of the greatest audiences that has ever attended one of its lectures tonight, and hundreds of persons were unable to obtain admission. The bishop's subject was The True Secret of Success.

His lordship gave a graphic statement of the work among the poor of the east end of London, in which he had figured largely, showing the wonderful good that had been accomplished by missions of the Church in the social uplift of the people in that quarter of the world's metropolis. He proceeded to name four qualities which were necessary to success, not only in work such as he had been describing, but in the upbuilding of individual character, or of a nation. These were: First, absolute straightness; secondly, humility and absence of "side or 'fills"; thirdly, genuine human sympathy; fourthly, faith and belief in that wonderful power which we call God. Possessing these qualities nothing could prevent a man from becoming a power for good himself, nor stop Canada from becoming a great people.

Mayor Chisholm and President Forrest, of Dalhousie University, moved a vote of thanks, which was carried amid loud applause. Just as the company were about to rise the chairman announced that he had a telegram to read. It was as follows:

"Balmoral Castle, Sept. 8, 1910. To the Right Rev the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia: 'I have received with much satisfaction the telegram which you have sent me on behalf of the Church of England in Canada holding congress in Halifax, and I thank you most warmly for the assurances of loyalty to my throne to which it gives expression. (Signed) 'George R. I.'"

As soon as the import of the message was realized every guest rose to his feet. The National Anthem was sung with fervor, and three cheers followed.

This Illustration Shows the Patent Fire Pot Used in the Blazer Furnace
