—MR. NEWTON McARTHUR.—It is with deep regret that The Guardian records the death of Mr. Newton McArthur, which took place at Margate on Wednesday morning. Deceased was 70 years of age and had been ill for about two years. The late Mr. McArthur was a life-long resident of Margate and was one of the most prosperous farmers in that district. There are left to mourn one son, John, of Margate, and seven daughters. Of the latter all now reside in other parts of Canada and United States but two, Mrs. E. Utch, of Margate, and Miss Carrie at home. Mrs. T. C. Baker, Summerside, and Robert McArthur, of Miscouche, are a sister and brother, respectively, of the deceased. The funeral takes place this (Friday) afternoon, to the Margate cemetery.—J.

—ELECTRIC STORM.—The electrical storm which passed over Charlottetown last Sunday about midnight was quite severe. It struck a house belonging to Mr. N. C. Pearson now occupied by Mr. Jas. Siliker. —MOTHERS' PENSION PLAN Novel Undertaking by People of an Indiana Town A mothers' pension plan is in effect in Evansville, although there is no law in Indiana creating a mothers' pension fund. The pension arose in this way. Mrs. Alice Kelley, widow, announced through a newspaper that she would be forced to give away two of her children. She said that since the death of her husband she had earned a scant living at the wash tub, but that her health had begun to fail and she felt she could bear the burden no longer. Mrs. J. H. Conn, president of the Cumberland Circle of King's Daughters, took up the matter, and several other people in the city became interested and agreed to give Mrs. Kelley a certain sum each week for one year. This led to the organization of Mothers' Pension Club No. 1, and the club has paid Mrs. Kelly \$2.50 each week.

—An Awkward Motto A good story relating to the Erskine family motto is recalled by the recent death of Lord Erskine, who was a great-grandson of the famous first Lord Erskine, Lord Chancellor of Great Britain. For centuries the family motto had been "judge not." When the first Lord Erskine became Lord Chancellor, chief of all the judges of the Empire and the Sovereign's legal adviser, the motto was obviously an awkward dictum to appear on the panels of his carriage and elsewhere. His Lordship proved himself to be a man of the times and invented a new motto for himself—"Trial by jury"—which has ever since appeared beneath the family arms.

—What Are Meteors. Meteorites, or air stones, are metallic or stony masses of matter falling from the sky, and the fire meteors, which are occasionally seen rushing through the air with an average velocity of more than 30 miles per second, seem to be aerolites, which have escaped contact with this planet. WASHING IN GOLD

Winners of Money Take Baths in Gold Coins A French journalist who had speculated in railway shares won a large sum of money from a lucky venture. Drawing it in gold, he proceeded to an hotel, emptied the bags of gold in the bed, and went to sleep in it. Paganini, the violinist, when he received the proceeds of his concert (he insisted upon being paid in gold), used to wash his hands in sovereigns. A French novelist, Soulie, wrote a book called "The Memoirs of the Devil." It was successful; the publishers paid him for the first volume \$10,000 in gold. 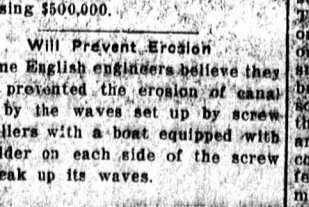
TEACH BOYS CARE OF CLOTHES

To keep the coats and other wear from soiling, boys should have plenty of hangers which may be had very cheaply. Also for 5c. cents, at many stores, but it pays to get good ones. To remove the dust, keep a small one or rattan beater, and whip them thoroughly; then lay the garment out smoothly on a table and with a hard bristle brush for mud spots, and a soft brush for ordinary use, go over the garment thoroughly until all mud and dust is removed. If the garment could be hung in the hot sun for a few hours before doing this, it would make the cleaning easier. Begin at the top of the garment and brush down.

If the elbows and knees of the trousers are baggy, and out of shape, lay a damp cloth on them and fold them up for an hour or two; then lay them on the ironing board, or slip a board used for the purpose inside, smooth with the palm of the hand, until they lie flat; cover with a cloth and press with a hot iron until dry. Do not iron the garment, but press it; there is a difference. If the collars and elbows are shiny, sponge with a damp cloth and press until dry. If boys were taught to care for their clothes while at home, instead of leaving it for mother or sister, they would find the pleasure of looking well-dressed much lessened when they are thrown on their own resources away from home.

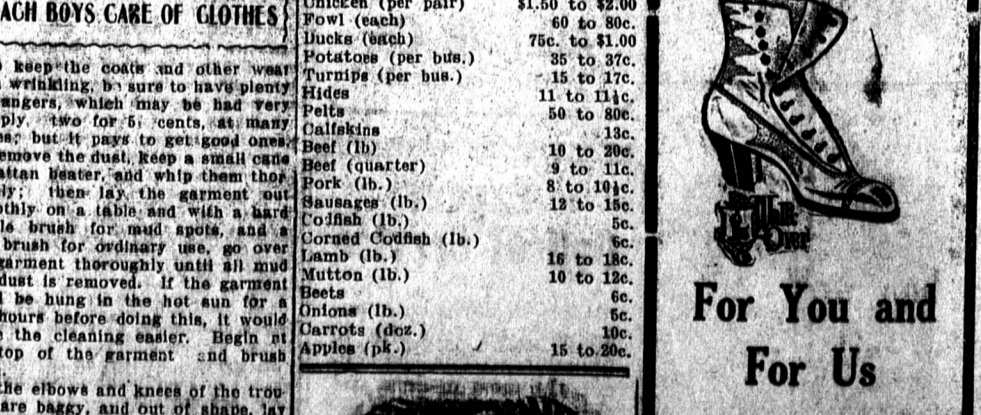
