LAST WILD BUFFALO WILL BE KILLED

MONTREAL, Feb. 13.—The last survivor of the countless millions of Buffalo that used to roam the western plains of Canada is to die this fall at the hands of the executioner, it is announced here recently by Howard Douglas, commissioner for the government parks in the west.

It was captured thirty-seven years ago as a calf, with a number of other buffaloes for a private collection and later passed into the hands of Sir Donald Smith, now Lord Strathcona, who presented it with a cozen of the Dominion government.

The sole original survivor, "Sir Donald," has long since passed his day, and been driven away from the herd by the younger bulls, and Commissioner Douglas stated that on his return this lone survivor of the wild herds would be shot, and his carcass mounted for exhibition purposes.

WORK AT THE MINT.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—The Canadian mint has coined 636 gold sovereigns, silver to the value \$313,328, and cents to the value of \$23,290. The silver coins have all been from bullion purchased from Trull.

CONVICT PEWS FOR A CHURCH

OTTAWA, February 13.—In the house of commons recently on penitentiary supply, quite a breeze sprang up in reference to some pews made for St. Matthew's (Anglican) church, Ottawa, by the convicts at St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary.

Mr. Dawson, the penitentiary inspector, is a member of St. Matthew's congregation. He suggested that if the church furnished the lumber that he would donate the labor. The labor was furnished by the convicts, and Mr. Dawson paid the government \$104.

LANDMARKS WIPED OUT BY A MOVING BOG

DUBLIN, Feb. 13.—More than 100 acres of fertile land have been lost forever by the bog slide at Lisnaree County Galway, and further damage is threatened.

The bog is now covered with a twelve feet of solid bog, and will never be worth anything for agriculture again.

The entire face of the district has been changed. Rivers and roads have disappeared, and all landmarks have been obliterated.

Efforts were made to recover the body of Mrs. McDonnell, the old woman who was overboard and drowned in her cottage. Nothing but the outer walls of the cabin remained and yesterday morning a frail causeway of planks was laid over the quaking bog.

Laurence Martin, whose house was also submerged, had a narrow escape. He was awakened by a noise, which he declared resembled thunder, and when he opened the door of his house, he was almost smothered by the rush of bog and water.

ZOO LION ATTACKS VENTURESOME VISITOR

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The folly of visitors to the Zoological Gardens attempting to feed the lions and other animals through the bars of their cages was exemplified by an incident which occurred on Thursday morning.

Around the outside cages of the lion's house is an iron railing some three feet high to keep the public out of harm's way.

On an instant a lion had shot forth a paw and caught the man's right arm with its claws. A scene of wild confusion ensued.

The lion was spitting and snarling at the man, and the bystanders crowded in pulling Percival away as he fell.

AN ADDRESS ON MUNROE DOCTRINE

John S. Ewart of Ottawa Addressed the Members, Who Listened With Interest. He Asks What Would Canada Do.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 14—(Special)—Members listened with interest to address by John S. Ewart, Ottawa, on the "Munroe doctrine."

"Ought there to be arrangement between the various parts of the Empire for co-operation in case of war and if so, what should be its nature?" was principal point discussed.

Ewart raised the question whether Canada should become an active supporter of what is known as the Munroe doctrine.

"In some British wars Canada would probably decline to take part. If, for example the United Kingdom were at war with France, Canada ought to be neutral. With great difficulty his cordiality has been cultivated between the English speaking and French speaking Canadians.
