Daily Lenten Meditations Hear My Prayer By A JOURNALIST For the good they comprehend not; And their feeble hands and helplessness, Groping blindly in the darkness, Touch God's right hand in that darkness. And are lifted up and strengthened.

A remarkable and comprehensible anthology of writings on prayer is published under the title of "Hear My Prayer" (Hodder and Stoughton, 5s), and as it consists of some five hundred large "pages" of quality material, it is well worth the big price which will appreciate a work of this character. Justification for calling prayer natural is found in the fact that mankind never outgrows prayer. Both the practice and the theory of it have proved infinitely adaptable to all stages of culture. From pagan beginnings to Jesus alone in the Garden, prayer has proved capable of unlimited development. It has been crushed but has been lifted into finer forms by spiritual and intellectual advance. It has shaped its course like a river, to the banks of each generation's thought; but it has flowed on, fed from fountains that change banks do not affect. Both in the Scripture and out of it, the quality of prayer is suited to the breadth or narrowness of view, to the generosity or bitterness of spirit, to the generation or the individual. As Sabatier puts it, "The history of prayer is the history of religion." At one end of the scale is the prayer of the savage bosoms. There are longings, strivings, yearnings
