Holman is sent in Charlottetown. It is understood that the steamer Morwenia, which is due here from Montreal this morning, is bringing three cars.

**PLEASANT OUTING.**—Spend the Monday half-holiday at Holland Cove and have supper at Holland Hall. Motor boat leaves Marine Wharf at 2.30 and 4.30 for Holland Cove district and returns in the evening. Carriage at Rocky Point meets the ferry boat leaving Charlottetown at 9.30, 11.00 a.m. and 1.30, 2.30, 3.30 and 6.30 p.m., last boat returning at 8.30 p.m.

**RIFLE SHOOTING.**—Several members of the Civilian Rifle Club, of Charlottetown, were out at the Kensington Range on Saturday afternoon for a practice shoot. Three scores of 90 points were made—by Messrs. E. Love, George Rogers and G. R. Beer, the last named of whom got 84 out of 85 at the 500 yards. The members of the club are reminded that there will be a spoon shoot this afternoon commencing at two o'clock. All who attend are requested to do so. Besides the chance of winning such excellent attractions, the opportunity is afforded to practice for the forthcoming Provincial shoot, and more immediately for the return match against the Summerside team, which is to take place on Wednesday.

**SPRINGFIELD.**—The regular monthly meeting of the Women's Institute was held in the Springfield Temperance Hall on Friday, July 11th. A large attendance gave ample proof of the interest taken in the work by the women of the surrounding vicinity. It was unanimously agreed that the Institute be known as the "Springfield Institute." Subject under discussion was the Iceing of Cakes and labor saving devices. Many useful and valuable recipes were interchanged, also many helpful methods of labor-saving devices in the home. A large number became members of the Institute and everything gives evidence of a successful career for this Institute. The next meeting will be held on August 15th at 7.30 p.m., when it is expected that the Supervisor will be present. Subjects for discussion: Bread-making and Biscuits. A cordial invitation is extended to all ladies of the district whether members or not to be in attendance at this meeting.

**ANOTHER BODY FOUND.**—Early on Saturday morning a gruesome discovery was made on Governor's Island by Mr. Judson, a fisherman, who

in the course of his fishing rounds came across, lying on the shore at the north side of the island, where it had evidently been thrown up by the sea, the greatly decomposed body of a male person. He at once communicated with Mr. A. Hennessey, the well-known undertaker of the city, and pending the latter's arrival he took the body in his dory as far inshore as possible, but to get to the spot where he eventually left it necessitated a drive of the hearse for a mile out on the sands. The body was brought to Charlottetown, and in view of the finding of a previous body and its identification as that of Capt. Cormier of the Polar Star which was lost off Point Prim six weeks ago, it was thought that this body might be the remains of another of the drowned crew of the ill-fated schooner, viz., Henry Bushie and Macdonald. The relatives of these two men were communicated with, and portions of the clothing still remaining on the greatly decomposed body was sent to them for their identification, but neither Mrs. Bushie nor Macdonald's sister was in a position to claim recognition of the clothing, which, however, clearly was that of a sailor, and so, unclaimed and unreturned, the remains of the poor mortal who had thus met his end were consigned to the grave, the interment taking place the same afternoon.

**THE PLAYGROUND.**—Boards of Education in the cities have recognized the fact that play is educational, and are turning their school yards into playgrounds. "Better a playground without a school-house than a school-house without a playground," says a noted medical writer. Not only are the educators realizing the need of using the school yards, but they have become aroused to the reasonableness of the proposition that if the school buildings are used only 25 per cent of the day time, for study, they should be used some of the remaining time for play, and so in many communities recreation centres have been opened where the children may go for a good time, where not only the younger children may go for a good time, but the older boys and girls who have left school to go to work may come in the evenings to enjoy clubs of all kinds, gymnastic exercises, where the parents may come to enjoy lectures, and get in touch with the educational tendency. Arrangements have been made to use Prince Street School grounds to give a stereopticon lecture on Tuesday evening. A set of slides showing playground work has been secured by Secretary Reilly of the Y. M. C. A. and the whole community will have the opportunity to see them without any expense whatever.
