Mr. Will Wood as Bill Meader, father of Almada was all that could be desired in the role of a pauper. Lewis Herman as Jim Meader, son of Bill, kept the audience in high humour. Mr. M. MacRae as Mr. Irving, proved himself a clever father who in spite of fly paper and runaway horses knew how to pick a husband for his obedient daughter Lisle. Music was supplied between the acts by Master Alfred MacNeill, accompanied by Mrs. Beatrice Judson on the piano. These numbers received hearty applause. MAKING BUTTER.

In working butter a sliding or scraping motion should be avoided. The lever should be pressed downward only, for by sliding the lever a greasy, salty butter is produced. When the butter is levelled over the worker toss a little of it back from the left side with the spade to get the lever down on the board. Revolve the lever away from the butter and it will cause it to fall over and form a large roll. Press the lever well into the butter at the right hand side, and with a quick movement make it bring the butter over to the centre. Shift the roll lengthwise across the worker and begin again in the centre and work as before. Three points

should be observed in determining when butter is worked enough. 1. It should have a firm, glossy appearance. 2. The texture should be smooth and resemble the granular structure of the broken end of a steel rod. 3. There should be no grittiness

due to the uneven distribution of undissolved salt. 4. Test for this by taking a small piece between the teeth.

PRINTING AND PACKING

The one-pound prints are most convenient and in greatest demand.

Use a good printer for shaping them. The prints should be neatly wrapped in parchment paper, which may have the name and address of the maker printed on it. Other methods of packing butter are in crocks, tubs and boxes. Neat appearance and cleanliness of the package count for much in securing the best possible price for the butter.

The Dominion Dairy Industry Act requires that all dairy butter put up for sale in blocks, squares, or prints, and wrapped in parchment paper, must have the words "Dairy Butter" printed on the parchment paper in letters at least one-half inch long and

one quarter of an inch square. The same regulations provide further that every person who packs dairy butter in boxes similar to those used for packing creamery butter shall brand the boxes with the words, "Dairy Butter" in letters at least one-half inch long and three-eighths of an inch wide.

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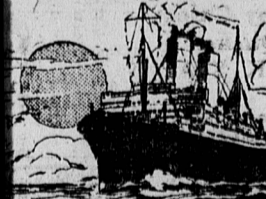
