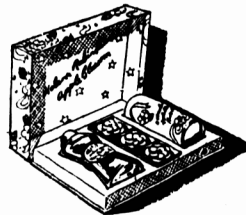

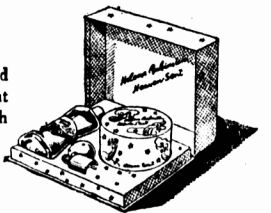

\$35,700 Top Price At Newmarket Sales

NEWMARKET, England, Dec. 2 (AP)—Lord Milford paid the top price of \$35,700 for a yearling colt at the opening today of the annual December race horse sales, which make Newmarket the Mecca for the racing fraternity this week. The figure, far from a record, was for a yearling colt named Fragrant View, a half sister to Airborne, winner of the Derby this year and the season's top money earner. Today's sales brought a total of \$7,295,000 (\$356,639) for 116 animals.

port is indicated in the Preface. It tells the story of the way in which the British and Foreign Bible Society has distributed the Book of God's Plenty to a new world during the past twelve months. The titles of the chapters indicate the scope and variety of the Society's many activities throughout the world. "The Book of God's Plenty" "God's Plenty in Translations" "The Sower of Plenty," "Getting Going on the Continent," "The First Year in India," "The Curtain Rises in China," "Unity in South America," "In the Commonwealth," "The Haywards Health Conference," "God's Plenty in Gifts."

Naturally there is much to report about re-starting the work in many lands in Europe, whilst other continents are neglected. As the theme unfolds, it is interesting to find that the work in China has been resumed; that there is unity in operation between the American Bible Society and the British and Foreign Bible Society in South America, and that in the Empire Commonwealth the British and Foreign Bible Society continues to operate through its Auxiliaries, over that vast area of the world's surface. There is an interesting account of the formation of the Council of United Bible Societies. Within this Council each Society will be self-governing, and make collections within its own territory. The main object of this federation is to develop a sense of unity in the one great purpose for which all Bible Societies exist, namely the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment. Gifts to the Society during the past year have shown a large increase, but the programme needed for replenishment of the printed Word throughout the world will require even greater generosity and more sacrificial giving than Christian people have yet been called on to manifest.

Of course, seeing as how the young mother is like the jealous Turk who bears no rival near the throne, if Grandma had an ounce of worldly knowledge instead of being all heart, she would keep from under your feet and off of your nerves, by sensing your folly and never coming even to look at the baby unless especially invited, and she would no more kiss it than give it poison. And, little as you think it, that would be the baby's loss, for doctors have had a change of heart about Grandmas and the finest pediatricians are now prescribing them. They say that babies get lonesome and bored when they are left too much by themselves, and they need to be cuddled and fussed over and walked and sung to, and that nobody can do this so well as Grandma.

And listen, young mother, get a line on your own conduct and what the inevitable results are going to be, and see if you don't think you will pay a pretty high price for monopolizing the baby and being jealous of Grandma. To begin with, you are taking the first fatal step in alienating your husband from you. He is fond of his parents and grateful to them for making his young married life easy and comfortable instead of the struggle it is to most young couples. Do you think he will ever forgive you for hurting these good, kind people? Never. It will rankle in his mind as long as he lives. Then consider that the baby isn't your sole possession. It belongs to his family as well as to you, and you are doing a cruel thing when you shut them out of the picture.

Also, think of this. Some day this little baby will have a little child of his own. How will you feel if another selfish, jealous young mother shuts you away from the child that is bone of your bone and flesh of your flesh and heart of your heart?
