watered down—apart from the Russian and Czech agreements—to a newly defined concord of non-aggression, consultation in event of aggression, and finally non-assistance to an aggressor state in the hope Poland and Germany will be induced to enter.

Confounding the puzzle are the questions of Poland and the quarrel between Italy and Ethiopia which has obvious and possible serious European aspects. Whether Pilsudski's successors can maintain the "strong man's" success in keeping Poland balanced between Germany and Russia is of course of first importance. On Pilsudski's death, Berlin and Moscow and Paris vied in the warmth of their condolences.

**League Meets Monday**

Monday the League Council meets to discuss the Ethiopian problem and here the hope is that diplomacy will prevent a breach, not so much between Italy and Ethiopia as between Italy and the League. Mussolini steadily sends men and equipment to his colonies in East Africa and tells other powers in so many words he considers it an Italian colonial affair; yet Ethiopia is a member of the League in good standing and the League is pledged to arbitration. League handling of the dispute is the only correct procedure, but here the concern is over Italy's stand and consequently the effect on the prestige of the League.

Indicative of the speed with which happenings have occurred is the fact that it is just four weeks since the League Council saw Britain, France and Italy staunchly behind the French resolution condemning Germany's rearmament—a motion passed unanimously with the abstention of Denmark.

It rests with Herr Hitler whether the nations of Europe shall continue to "guarantee security" by increasing their arms.
