Country stations shipping prices are higher than Charlottetown dealers. Market good for Grades A's, but drab for undergrades. Large percentage shipments going to other Maritime points. Charlottetown dealers are paying for ungraded eggs: AL 31¢; AM 30¢; B 29¢; C 28¢. Country stations are paying for ungraded eggs: AL 22-26¢; AM 30-33¢; B 24-26¢; C 20-21¢. Graded farm eggs delivered Charlottetown: AL 38¢; AM 36¢; B 28 1-2-29¢; C 23-24.

GRAHAM PLUM PUDDING
