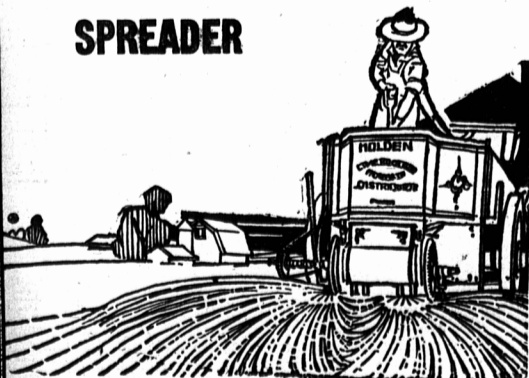

—RECORD FIRST FLIGHT BY MOTORLESS GLIDER

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 24—A motorless glider today was released from the Graf Zeppelin at a height of 2,000 feet, marking the first time, German aviation authorities said, that a glider had been successfully released from a dirigible in motion. The zeppelin was making a speed of 35 miles an hour, and further experiments at speeds up to 80 miles an hour are planned. If successful, gliders may be used to land mail or passengers from an airship, making it unnecessary for the latter to land.

—WOMEN'S SHOES HIGHEST IN LEATHER OUTPUT

OTTAWA, May 24—(C.P.): Women's shoes comprised 50 per cent of the output of leather footwear in Canada during last year, while men's represented 36 per cent, misses and children, 14 per cent, babies and infants, six per cent and boys and youths, only four per cent.

## McGill Professor Discusses Maritime Claims Question

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 24—The case of the Maritime Province people who claim they had gained little and lost much, through confederation would be much stronger if it were possible to show the exact amount of trade between the Maritime Provinces and the rest of Canada. Prof. J. C. Hemmion of the department of economics, McGill University, stated today.

In a paper read at a point session of the Canadian political science and Canadian Historical Associations Prof. Hemmion left no doubt he was in sympathy with those who shared the belief that the Maritime had "gained little and lost much" in the union which resulted in formation of the Dominion.

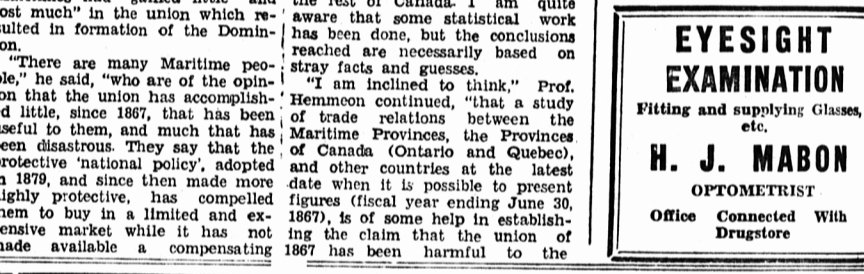
"There are many Maritime people," he said, "who are of the opinion that the union has accomplished little, since 1867, that has been useful to them, and much that has been disastrous. They say that the protective 'national policy,' adopted in 1879, and since then made more highly protective, has compelled them to buy in a limited and expensive market while it has not made available a compensating market where they may sell their own products."

"By way of further explanation they say that their own goods are not needed to any extent in Quebec, Ontario and the Western Provinces, while the goods that they need have to be purchased in those provinces at prices much higher than those which prevail in the competitive markets of the world."

"There is little doubt that their statements are to a certain extent true, but their case would be much stronger if it were possible to show the exact amount of the trade between the Maritime Provinces and the rest of Canada. I am quite aware that some statistical work has been done, but the conclusions reached are necessarily based on stray facts and guesses."

"I am inclined to think," Prof. Hemmion continued, "that a study of trade relations between the Maritime Provinces, the Provinces of Canada (Ontario and Quebec) and other countries at the latest date when it is possible to present figures (fiscal year ending June 30, 1887), is of some help in establishing the claim that the union of 1867 has been harmful to the
