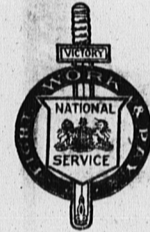

SUMMER CAMP A SUCCESS.—One of the most successful sessions of the Freetown Summer School for the study of Missions and Christian Leadership was brought to a close Wednesday evening, the 22nd inst. Birch Grove was never more entrancing in its beauty or the weather more auspicious for a summer camp than that of the past week. And the pleasant hours spent in the out-of-doors classes and in healthful recreation passed all too quickly. Prof. Watson of Mt. Allison University conducted the Bible Study Class each morning from 8:30 to 9:30, while Rev. H. H. Irish and Miss Blackhill of China, Rev. W. H. Barraclough of Central Methodist Church, Moncton and Rev. G. M. Young of Fredericton conducted classes in Missions and Methods. Each evening an open air service was conducted on the lawn of Mr. Davis Schurman and at 8 o'clock illustrated lectures were delivered in the Church which attracted crowds that were both instructive and inspiring. The success of the Freetown school during the past four years has demonstrated the wonderful possibilities of such a school, both from an educative and inspirational point of view, and the hope has been generally expressed that in the near future the school may be established on a permanent basis. Rev. Geo. Morris and J. M. Rice were re-elected President and Secy-Treasurer respectively of the Summer School Continuance Committee.

WORK ON LOWER QUEEN ST.—Lower Queen Street, long famed for its hills and hollows, and loose stones on the surface presents a very changed appearance just now after being graded and gone over from end to end with the street roller in preparation for receiving its new covering of tarvia. Concrete curbs are being placed along the sides and are nicely rounded at the intersecting street corners. The work of installing the new surface drains is going forward at a very satisfactory rate. Excavating on the East side of the street is finished and this work is now being done on the West side.

THE EVENING STAR.—Venus is evening star. She is ascending now, and every day will be seen higher until for a few days she will appear to stand still. She will then start retrograding—a puzzling phenomenon—for while the planet moves from west to east, it appears travelling from east to west, but were it possible to draw a visible curve through space it would be noticed that the planet is returning from west to east on the other limb of the orbit. The impression is given that she moves in a straight line in both directions, hence the confusion. Venus is smaller than the earth; not much, however; her year is a few months shorter. The astronomers agree as to Venus being always covered by heavy clouds, but disagree as to revolving on an axis, which gives rise to great speculations as to the extraordinary climatic conditions and the sort of life prevailing there.

PARIS.—Gen. Pershing told the Associated Press that the war can only be won by hard and forceful blows delivered by a well trained American army working in conjunction with the Allied armies. Deploring the lukewarmness of the American people in regard to the war, the general added: "Every man, woman and child should support the administration in its determination to arm and equip the American army and to keep up its morale and that of the Allied Armies. This war will not be won by talk or by subscribing to the Red Cross. The American people must come to a full realization of what the war means. It can be won only by striking hard and forceful blows." The general was very emphatic in his interview.
