The Teachers' Recital of the Seminary staff is looked forward to with great interest. This is posted for November 2. The musical department is being rigorously pushed forward to the first ranks with other schools of music in the Eastern Provinces and in all lines of work the Seminary grows year by year. Commenting upon this the exchange remarks that it is fairly good talk, except that the candidate is describing purely, imaginary conditions.
