SOMETHING WRONG IN ST. PETERSBURG

Military Proclamation Issued Forbidding Assemblages on Streets. Newspapers are not being issued and Tramway Service is Suspended.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, March 12 - A Reuter despatch from Petrograd says General Chavoiloff, commander of the Petrograd district, has issued a proclamation forbidding assemblages in the streets and warning citizens that troops have been authorized to use arms or any means to preserve order in the capital.

DISCUSSION ON IRISH HOME RULE

Summary of Lloyd-George's Address.

The Nationalist resolution was introduced by T. P. O'Connor, who asserted that the manner in which the Government had handled the Irish rebellion had transformed a friendly people into one filled with bitter hatred against England.

At one point in his address he paid tribute to the President of the United States, saying that President Wilson in his recent speeches and notes had shown that the United States' Government recognized the rights of small nations and the principle of nationality.

Mr. O'Connor was followed by William A. Redmond, who made an impassioned plea for a compromise between the Nationalists and Unionists and sat down amid the applause of the House.

The Government, said the Premier, was ready to confer self-government on those parts of Ireland clearly demanding it. That was the position of the late Government. Was there any party in the House, or were there any Home Rulers, who contemplated using force to compel Ulster to submit?

Mr. Lloyd-George was continually interrupted, and as he proceeded, was greeted with angry cries from the Nationalists, who accused him of deserting Home Rule. In conclusion, he offered an amendment to the Nationalist resolution to the effect that "This House would welcome any settlement which would produce a better understanding between Ireland and the rest of the United Kingdom, but considers it impossible to impose by force on any section of Ireland a form of government which has not their consent."

Call Dominion Ministers In. As the Premier sat down, ex-Premier Asquith rose and began a conciliatory speech. He pointed out the seriousness of the situation and advocated a compromise. He suggested that the ministers of the Dominion who were in England should be called in to act as mediators and report to Parliament.

DEADLY TORNADO IN INDIANA, U.S.A.

Many Lives Lost. Property Damage Exceeds a Million. Two Thousand Homes Damaged.

CAPTURED TWO THIRDS TURK ARTILLERY

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, March 12 - After announcing the fall of Bagdad in the Commons, Mr. Andrew Bonar Law said there was every reason to believe that two thirds of the Turkish artillery had fallen into the hands of the British or been thrown into the Tigris.

HOW U. S. SAILORS WERE USED BY HUNS

(Special to the Guardian.) ZURICH, March 12 - American sailors from the Yarrowdale claim that the raiders who sank the vessel were the Ritz, of Bremen. She was a new vessel of three thousand tons, eighteen knots and fitted with steel cells for prisoners in the hull.

GERARD HINTS AT CONDITIONS IN GERMANY

(Special to the Guardian.) NEW YORK, March 12 - A despatch from Havana says: "The appalling conditions prevailing throughout Germany were revealed when James W. Gerard, recalled American Ambassador at Berlin, and party arrived here from Spain. While Gerard refused to make any statement before he sees the President several who left Germany with him said the people were starving and did not care whether they were to die of hunger or from lack of food."

"A GERMRN PRISONER FOR EVERY YARD"

The Splendid Sweep of British Troops into Irls, which had been Strongly Fortified. Germans Caught in Trap and Killed or Captured.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, March 12 - With bag and baggage the Germans admitted the loss of Irls, southwest of Bapaume, the capture of which constitutes one of the most brilliant pieces of work by British troops during the advance north of the Ancre and Somme rivers.

CITY COUNCIL IN ANNUAL SESSION

Street Car Proposition Given Knock-Out Blow by Vote of Two Councillors. School Estimates Submitted and Other Business Discussed.

The City Council met in regular monthly session last evening, Mayor Brown, Health Officer McMillan, Mr. D., and every Councillor, being present. After the usual routine of reading the minutes and bills a number of communications were read.

One of these was from the "Charlottetown Hotel Company" in reference to their application to the Legislature for exemption from taxation for twenty years on property valued at over \$40,000 and asking the Council to pass a resolution recommending it.

A committee was submitted from the secretary of the Board of School Trustees, Mr. B. Balderson, notifying the Council that the estimated expenditure for the school year ending December 31st, 1917, is \$18,653.32, an increase of \$3,231.08 over the previous year.

A letter was read from Mr. A. McEwen, Ambrose Street, complaining of damage caused by geese trespassing on his gardens and tearing up the plants therein and wanting to know if there was not some law to deal with such a nuisance.

A resolution was read from the Commissioners of Sewerage and Water Supply, requesting the Council to authorize at their first meeting an issue of \$10,500 debentures to cover the cost of completing the installation of machinery and driven well system and the extension of pipe line to districts not connected with the system, said debentures to be made an issue of water works debentures.
