THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Mar. 19. —The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was quiet, there being little demand from any source for supplies. In Canadian western oats the feeling was weak, but in sympathy with the decline in futures 3 1/2 Winnipeg and dealers reduced 1c per bushel. No. 2 C.W. being quoted at 53. No. 3 C.W. at 58, extra No. 1 feed at 58. No. 1 feed at 53. No. 2 feed at 53. While Ontario and Quebec grades were unchanged. There was no actual change in prices for spring wheat grades of flour, but the undertone of the market was easier owing to the weakness that developed in Winnipeg for cash wheat and the fact that prices declined 3 1/2 to 4c per bushel for contract grades. There was a steady demand from foreign imports for supplies and some business was accomplished, but the volume was not large and the market was quiet. The movement for domestic account was again somewhat limited, the demand being confined chiefly to small lots in mixed car orders, at unchanged prices. There was no change in the condition of the millfeed market today and prices were fully maintained. The baled hay market remained unchanged and the prices quoted were on the same level as yesterday. The volume of business was large on the egg market today there being a good demand for supplies and an active trade was done. Prices were unchanged. There were no further developments in the condition of the market for potatoes but the undertone was very firm as there continues to be a good demand for supplies for shipment from the interior and a fairly active trade was done in the Prince Edward Island and Quebec varieties with unchanged prices. Trade in beans was quiet and the market was without feature. Prices remained quiet yesterday with a few sales being done. There were no new developments in the butter situation the undertone being firm, and supplies were limited. Prices remain as quoted yesterday. The condition of the cheese market remained unchanged. Sugar prices remained as quoted yesterday.

ABEGWEITS GRAB VICTORY HALF MINUTE FROM BELL

"Chick" Williams on Pass From Gordon Scores Winning Count, 4 to 3—Game Featured Throughout by Thrilling Work of Both Sextets—Abbies Have The Edge.

Twenty-five seconds before the final bell, with the score deadlocked 3 to 3, Jack Gordon paced by "Chick" Williams travelling at terrific speed swept down on the Moncton defence, the former, on the big side of the red line snapped the disc to Williams who circled the net and with a well-timed rockshot dropped the gutta percha over the right shoulder of "Gibber" Wilson for the fourth and winning goal of the match. Here in years—barring none— it was a final setting in a favorable comparison to anything ever handed out on the "big time circuit"—and the writer witnessed more than one game of the Canadian professional winter pastime.

The attendance last night was slightly over that which attended the initial fixture, about 700 customers, and to those who were unfortunate enough in not being present, sincere sympathy is extended. They, meaning the absentees missed a treat far exceeding anything in skating and stickhandling but around hockey, which made even the reporters forget that the clash was of an exhibition variety. From bell to bell in each and every twenty minutes the clip cut out by both sextets was easily appropriate to the surface beneath their steel blades; they skated and stickhandled like a prairie fire, and but for the masterly and uncanny work of "Dutchy" Diamond and Charlie Wilson in their respective nets, the score would have undoubtedly been around the century mark. In their weight of rubber riffs in their avocations could be ascertained the avoidpulis would total around a ton.

The story of last night's game to chronicle in detail would necessarily keep the writer late for breakfast, so fast and so dynamic were the thousand and one plays executed, therefore a summary has not to suffice for the above mentioned who were not present and for the satisfaction of those who were.

The Atlantics fresh over a well earned win with their reinforcements, Ken Carroll, Cole and Harry Wall, a hundred percent sub line, skated to the face-off last night to make hockey history—a double-header defeat to the Abegweits in their own back yard, but the Abbie spirit and hockey ability cropped to the fore and made the proverbial "exception to the rule." The red and black warts a rejuvenated band of rubber hunters last night and gave just a little bit more than they received; and the consensus of opinion throughout the Arena, even by the most rabid fan, was that the exhibition dished out by both teams would leave the majority of our leading maritime sextets so far behind, they would be lonesome—and excuse yesterday morning's repetition—"and that's not maybe."

EXPERIMENTAL FARM NOTE

COUD LIVER OIL IN CHICK FEEDING.

An experiment was conducted at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in 1924 to determine the effect of various vitamins rich feeds in the feeding of chicks. Fourteen pens of 40 chicks were housed in a pipe drooler house on a cement floor with planer shavings for litter. Pen 1 was the control pen and was fed a basal ration which consisted of standard scratch and mash composed of shorts middlings, cornmeal and oat flour equal parts, and one-half parts meal grit. Greens and both milk and water were supplied.

The other 13 pens were all fed this same ration plus, one or more feeds, which are recognized as being rich in vitamins. The additional feeds used were: wheat germ, rice polish, Laro yeast (a dead yeast prepared for feeding purposes) Fleischmann's yeast a dead yeast prepared for live oil, and raw liver.

At the end of the experiment, which lasted three weeks, pen 4, the lot on Laro yeast, showed no deaths, while pens 7 and 11, the lots on cod liver oil and cod liver oil and Laro yeast, showed but one each, whereas, some of the other pens showed considerable loss, the highest being pen 14 on cod liver oil and rice polish, which showed 8 deaths.

An outstanding feature of the experiment was the effect of the cod liver oil on leg weakness. In every pen in which cod liver oil was used, there were no signs of leg weakness. Whereas, in every pen, without exception, where cod liver oil was not used, there were chicks either off their legs or showing preliminary signs of leg weakness.

Further—at the end of the experiment, 15 chicks which were completely off their legs, were selected from the various lots, put into a pen, and fed a cod liver oil ration. One of these chicks was in such bad condition as to be almost unable to move, and had every appearance of being about to die.

In three days most of the chicks showed marked signs of improvement, by the fifth day they all appeared much better, by the eleventh day they were all back to normal, except the one previously mentioned chick, and by the fourteenth day this last chick was able to run around normally. The birds were then put on a standard ration and kept under observation for another three months, during which time there was no recurrence of leg weakness and they developed quite normally.

As these results are but a confirmation of previous work at this Farm the conclusion is that leg weakness may be prevented or cured in growing chicks, by the use of cod liver oil.

THE VALUE OF A MULCH FOR WINTER PROTECTION.

(Experimental Farms Note.)
Snow is one of the most important mulches for winter protection but, unfortunately, in some parts of Canada, it does not come soon enough to afford the necessary protection from severe frosts of sudden changes of temperature for certain plants that we desire to grow; nor does it remain long enough to protect the plants from sudden changes of temperature in spring.

Where one is not sure of snow coming early and remaining late in the spring and, where there is little snow in the winter, it is desirable to protect many plants with some kind of covering other than snow. Soil is one of the best of such covers or mulches, hence, in many parts of Canada, it should be used to protect grape vines, raspberries, roses, and other tender woody plants that can be readily covered by it. At Ottawa such a means of protection has been found very desirable. After soil, the next best covering, perhaps, is leaves and, where these are readily available, they should be used to afford a protective mulch and for additional protection where it is desirable to use very practical to

use much soil on prairies where leaves the fullest extent. It is advisable, however, to supplement to some extent with mill feeds so as to provide variety, ground oats, shorts, and a small percentage of oil cake make good supplements. Cornmeal, barley, buckwheat meal and buckwheat bran are finishing feeds and should be fed sparingly in the brood sow's ration if at all. Green feed in the ration, such as clover hay, alfalfa or manures, is extremely desirable. These have a certain feed value and also act as correctives and tonics.
