**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.  
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
In certain districts a homesteader: a good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.  
Duties Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation, pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.  
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erects house worth \$500.  
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of prairie, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

**ALLIES PRESS ONWARD**

Germans Continue to Fight Rearguard Actions.

Gen. Haig's Men Give the Foe No Time to Rest and the Teutonic Losses Continue to be Terrific—Some Huns Have Refused to Fight.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—British troops have captured Combles, between Bapaume and the River Somme, it was officially announced by the British War Office.

British troops have crossed the River Somme south and west of Peronne.

Between Hendecourt and the Arras-Cambrai road the Canadians attacked the German line and made favorable progress.

East of the Senese the forces of Field Marshal Haig made progress, capturing Bullecourt and Hendecourt les Cagnicourt.

The British also captured Cleury-sur-Comme, on the Somme River between Combles and Peronne.

On Friday the British pushed forward rapidly from Bapaume and are now fighting to the east of Frenclourt on the road to Cambrai and at Bancourt.

The Germans are fighting rearguard actions. The main enemy force seems to be in full retreat in this locality.

North of Bapaume the most important captures have been made. The strong defences which had been erected by the Germans at Bullecourt, Hendecourt, Hendecourt-les-Cagnicourt and Rieneourt-les-Cagnicourt have been stormed and captured.

At St. Leincourt especially were the defences strong, and the town sits atop high ground which in itself forms a natural defensive position. It had been thought that the Germans would hold on to this place desperately and they did for the first part of the attack.

Under the terrific British fire, however, the enemy broke as Haig's men stormed the place, and it is now firmly in British hands. Here the British are now within a few hundred yards of the famous Drocourt-Queant line, which probably is one of the strongest positions the enemy has ever erected on the Western front.

The Drocourt-Queant defences now consist of five lines of trenches, many machine guns and immense quantities of wire, and the ground is honeycombed with deep dugouts to offer shelter from bombardment.

The British attacked the Germans at dawn north of Ecourt-St. Mein and south of Bullecourt and this region also seems to have been cleared of the enemy. The Germans continue to bring up new troops in this locality. Another new Prussian division has been identified in the fighting during the night. This division was one which the Americans had smashed to pieces at Chateau-Thierry and since had been retreating and filling great gaps in the ranks somewhere in the enemy rear.

In the operations the British again have captured a number of prisoners and guns. Among the cannon is a 15-centimetre gun captured in front of Maurepas. A complete field battery was taken southeast of Bapaume.

In the Lys salient, where fires are burning at main places, indicating the withdrawal of the Germans, the lines of the British have been advanced to the east of Robermetz and north of Neuf-Beruin.

Reports of Germans refusing to fight continue to be secured. Reliable German information says: "On August 28 it was learned that the fifth company of the 22nd Reserve Infantry Regiment refused to go forward to relieve the fourth company, which had suffered heavy losses, as it had only gone out of line itself four days previously."

"The men refused for two hours, during which the commander threatened to send them forward under escort. In the end the men were persuaded after a heated argument about their duty to the Fatherland to which some of the men openly retorted: 'To hell with the Fatherland.'"

Terrific losses continue to be inflicted on the Germans. The Germans on a large section of the front to the east of Bapaume have not had hot food for three days, because British bombs smashed a large number of their rolling kitchens.

Gen. Humbert's troops, which took Noyon and advanced to Mount Simeon, to the northeast, resumed their attack Friday and are advancing up the difficult heights north of the Oise.

Machine guns have been placed on every point of vantage by the Germans and the struggle has become a sort of bush fighting. The enemy's machine guns are carefully concealed and command all paths leading up the hills and are capable of holding up a large force and obliging assaulting troops to dodge and surround the emplacements. It has been found that artillery preparations, however intense, never reaches all of them.

French soldiers after their experience in Thiscourt forest are becoming familiar with this Indian style of fighting, while the German machine gunners left behind so that the infantry might retire with greater security are becoming weary of their task.

When taken prisoner they complain that they alone have been sacrificed and they have been obliged not only to face the French but have been under fire of their own artillery, shells from the rear falling on the positions they have been left to hold.

This happened Thursday at Noyon and seemed to be happening Friday. Shells from the German artillery were falling short all around Mount Simeon and others were falling in Noyon. Those that fell in the city drove out of their hiding place 32 German soldiers who had been overlooked by the Zouaves, who cleared the streets on Thursday.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11—what apparently is a reliable report that an Italian steamship has sunk a German submarine in a fight off the Atlantic coast reached the navy department today and is being investigated.

**NOTICE TO UNITED STATES CITIZENS IN CANADA.**

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, MALE CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES IN CANADA, WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED BY THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, ARE MADE SUBJECT AND LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA, AND BECOME ENTITLED TO EXEMPTION OR DISCHARGE THEREFROM, UNDER THE CANADIAN LAWS AND REGULATIONS. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st August, 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

UNITED STATES CITIZENS of the description aforesaid who were IN CANADA ON 30th JULY, 1918, HAVE SIXTY DAYS FROM THAT DATE within which TO EXERCISE AN OPTION TO ENLIST or enroll IN THE FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES, or TO RETURN to the United States; and THOSE WHO for any reason SUBSEQUENTLY BECOME LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA HAVE THIRTY DAYS FROM THE DATE of the accruing OF SUCH LIABILITY within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. EVERY CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES TO WHOM THE REGULATIONS APPLY is required to REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR under the Military Service Act, 1917, FOR THE province or DISTRICT WITHIN WHICH he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF HIS OPTIONAL PERIOD and will be SUBJECT TO PENALTIES IF without reasonable excuse HE FAIL SO TO REPORT. For the information of those whom it may concern Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:—

**REGULATIONS**

3. EVERY MALE CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED IN THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, not including those who have diplomatic exemption, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF THE TIME LIMITED BY THE CONVENTION within which the Government of the United States may issue him a certificate of diplomatic exemption, SHALL TRULY REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR BY REGISTERED POST, and in writing which is plainly legible, his name in full, his occupation and the date of his birth; stating also whether he is single, married or a widower; and if the latter, whether he has a child living; and if married, the date of his marriage; and stating moreover his place of residence and usual post office address in Canada; and, if he reside within a city or place where the streets and dwellings are named and numbered, the name and number of his street and dwelling; or if he reside in another place, the lot and concession number, section, township, range, and meridian, or other definite description whereby his place of residence may be located, having regard to the custom of the locality in which he lives; and IF WITHOUT REASONABLE EXCUSE HE NEGLECT OR FAIL TO

REPORT IN THE MANNER and with the particulars aforesaid within the time limited as aforesaid, HE SHALL BE GUILTY OF AN OFFENCE, AND SHALL BE LIABLE UPON SUMMARY CONVICTION to a penalty not EXCEEDING FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, AND TO IMPRISONMENT for any term not exceeding six months, and moreover he shall incur A PENALTY OF \$10.00 FOR EACH DAY after the time when or within which he should have registered during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

4. EVERY UNITED STATES CITIZEN WHO HAS DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION, although not otherwise subject to these regulations SHALL WITHIN TEN DAYS after the granting of the same TRULY REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR, in like manner and with the same particulars as required by the last preceding section; and in addition he shall embody in his report a true and complete statement of the particulars of his certificate of diplomatic exemption. NEGLECT OR FAILURE without reasonable excuse to comply with the requirements of this section SHALL CONSTITUTE AN OFFENCE PUNISHABLE IN THE MANNER AND BY THE PENALTIES provided in the last preceding section.
