CURRAN AND Briggs baseball nine won one game and tied one in the doubleheader on their home diamond yesterday afternoon. They defeated the luckless R.C.A.F. aggregation in the first tilt by the score of 11 to 3, and battled to a one-all draw with the Charlottetown Abegweits in the second game which was called at the end of the sixth inning because of rain. MacLeod, who pitched for the sixmen, was the victim of four scratch singles in the early innings, and as the game progressed the C. & B. boys got to him more and more, hitting a number of solid smashes off his hooks. Daley on the mound for the construction crew was in fine shape, allowing only five hits, but he was hit by a triple and a left fielder by Jake Thurmier occurring in the final frame. Frankie Oatway had a perfect day at the plate hitting three for three, and to continue to shine in right field, getting a semi-shooting catch in the second which earned him a spirited burst of applause. Henry Gallant belted three in four trips and Mulholland, whose bunting was a feature of both games, hit two for three. Manager Les Gaudet also got a brace of hits, and a triple to right fielder was the only Airman to get two safe hits. The Flyers had one of their worst days in the field, collecting nine miscues. The Curran & Briggs infield performed brilliantly, getting ten assists with only one bobble, a rather excusable one at second base with the pitcher partly obscuring the play.

The Abegweits got their counter in the first inning on two successive base hits. With one out, McKinnon singled and stole second and second and third in quick succession.
