CLAIMS Labour Law Directed At Communism
The main purpose of the Trade Union Act passed in the Prince Edward Island legislature was for the purpose of combating Communism, declared Hon. Harry Wright in speaking in the House last night on the Budget debate. Mr. Wright denied that the Government had been compelled by action at Ottawa to change the Labor Union Act. "My answer to that is the words used by the Minister of Justice in the House of Commons," Hon. Dr. MacMillan retorted. Hon. Mr. Wright: "The hon. gentleman is misinterpreting that statement. The Minister only said that he understood the Act was to be amended." Dr. MacMillan: "You just got clear of it without having it disallowed." Mr. Wright maintained that when the Act was before the House last year the Government had stated definitely it was not the intention to prevent unions from amalgamating, but to put a stop to Communist domination. "I had it on good authority," he said, "that an agent of the Communists remained here until after our legislation was passed. Then he went back to Toronto. Had we not enacted that legislation, I am quite confident that we should have some Communists in this Province today. The leader of the Opposition ought to be very thankful that this Government had enough backbone to take action and prevent Communists from establishing themselves here." Mr. Wright said he fully approved of the Workmen's Compensation Act, and added that the Government was grateful to the Church Laymen's Council for helping to crystallize public opinion on this matter.

FARMERS' PRICES
Mr. Wright welcomed the statements by the Minister of Agriculture, showing that better farm prices were being received. This was not meant, however, that farmers were getting too much. In this connection he cited figures prepared by Mr. Hannam, president of the Federation of Agriculture, showing that the percentage of the national income received by farmers in Canada is still too low. He also quoted from a recent address by Mr. Leo McIsaac, with reference to the alarming increase in vacant farms in the past twenty years in this Province, as well as statistics from other sources. On the basis of these figures, he showed that today the laboring man, for an hour's labor, can purchase more food than ever before. Mr. Wright devoted the latter part of his address to a reply to G.C.F. statements.

OPENING REMARKS
In his opening remarks he congratulated the Premier on his able budget speech, and also the Government on its financing during the past year. The Opposition leader, he said, had condemned the Government's negotiation of the Federal Tax Agreement, as he had done the year previously. This agreement showed that a million and a half more dollars had accrued to the Province than would otherwise have been obtained. The income and corporation taxes this Province is surrendering do not amount to a great deal, and it enables this Province to share in the tax revenue of the wealthier Provinces. Mr. Wright maintained that the Island had not lost the benefit of the awards under the Duncan and White Commissions, these being included in the moneys receivable from Ottawa. In reply to criticism that the award under the Duncan Commission should have been paid up some years before it was received, Mr. Wright recalled Premier Saunders' complaint that he could not get the then Conservative Premiers of the other Maritime Provinces to cooperate with him

Let's Talk It Over
Good morning:
The average citizen gives very little thought or attention to the various municipal services which are kept up by the taxes that he, as a citizen, pays. The two most important of these services are the Fire and Police Departments. When a citizen needs the assistance of either of these agencies it is usually at a time of crisis and he is forcibly brought face to face with how really important their efficiency or departments are to him. Most of us, however, never have occasion to call on them and we only see them as onlookers, when they have to do their duty with reference to someone else.

Strangely enough the attitude of most citizens towards their Fire or Police Departments when watching them in action is rather critical. Yet they never think of speaking to their Councilor about whether the departments have the necessary equipment on hand to cope with an emergency, if they are under-staffed, or whether their personnel are under-paid. This attitude of indifference is strange when one realizes that either of these departments is only called on for action when one is in trouble. During those terrific storms early in March we venture that very few citizens even gave a thought to the possibilities involved if a bad fire should break out on a stormy night when the streets might be blocked and the apparatus would have difficulty in reaching the scene of the blaze. It is reassuring to know that the department took certain precautions on those nights but if we consider the situation for a minute we will soon see the utmost importance of keeping the streets clear for motor traffic at all times. Strangely enough, the fact that most of the equipment is now motorized brings the greatest danger. In the old days of horse-drawn equipment the horses and sleighs containing the hose could traverse all but the most highly trafficked streets. But now with motor equipment our firemen are helpless unless that equipment can move about the streets at all times. It is a matter for serious consideration whether Summerside has the snow removal equipment that it should have and citizens should interest themselves in this matter. A few days ago one of our policemen was attacked by a man using as a weapon the neck of a bottle which he held in such a way that the jagged ends were pointing outward. The officer sustained a cut from this bottle behind the ear which fortunately was not serious. His assailant was given only two months in jail. There are reports coming in from time to time of people, mostly drunks, being attacked and knocked out and while unconscious being robbed of their money. These things should make us consider if there is anything wrong with our law enforcement system which consists not only of the policemen but also involves every person connected with it, from our civic officials to our courts. All these things are matters to which citizens interested in the welfare of their communities should give some thought.

MORE RUSSIAN "FIRSTS"
LONDON, March 17 - (AP) - Russia claimed two more firsts today in the field of invention. Having already claimed the telephone, radio, electric light and airplane, among other things, as Russian inventions, Moscow radio said it was a Russian who invented the "first" milling machine of perfected design. A commentator said the same Russian, Andre Martov, also created the first "turmeric" latte.
