### Some Safety Thoughts for Christmas Season

That Christmas Tree: DO NOT decorate it with flimsy material and too garish candles or lights. Don't decorate your tree with paper, cotton or any other inflammable material. Use tinsel or non-inflammable material for decorations and be sure to set the tree securely so that the children and even the "grow-ups" in reaching for things cannot tip it over. DO NOT permit to be used candles, where electricity can be substituted. Even with the use of electric batteries the same would be far safer than the use of candles. But if candles are used let only the utmost caution prevail. DO NOT permit children to light or re-light the candles while the parents are absent from the room. They frequently set fire to their clothing instead. DON'T LEAVE the matches within reach of the children. Candles are meant to be lighted and if children can get matches they will experiment with them. They imitate their elders. Better caution "Dad" and "Brother" to be careful with cigar and cigarette stubs too.

DO NOT allow trees to remain inside of buildings after the holidays. The tree ignites readily when leaves and branches are dry. A large number of fires occur in January from this cause. Let the Home, Church, School or Store be warm but look out for overheated stoves and pipes.

MR. MERCHANT a fire in a crowded store has terrible possibilities of loss of life by panic as well as of financial loss and it is well to remember that the installing of amateur electric wiring and use of inflammable materials in decorations may void your insurance in case of fire.

WATCH SMOKERS: DO NOT permit them to light cigars, pipes or cigarettes while inside the building. Fill with holiday shoppers or while around decorations, etc.

**Many Famous Names in Library of Notre Dame**  
SOUTH BEND, Ind., Dec. 18.—Autographs of famous men, many of whose signatures to state papers changed the trend of history, form an interesting section of the library of the University of Notre Dame.

The collection was assembled by the late Byrnes, librarian, who has been several years arranging it for exhibition. Among the examples of warrior chirography are the signatures of the Duke of Wellington, George Washington, Ulysses S. Grant, Marshal Foch and General William T. Sherman.

Statesmen are represented by Charles Carroll, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; James G. Blaine, Abraham Lincoln and Daniel O'Connell, Irish orator and patriot.

In the literary group are the autographs of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, John Ruskin, Fitz-Greene Halleck and Bayard Taylor. King Henry IV of England, is another signature in the collection.

**Call Tenders For Steamship Service**  
(Canadian Press.)  
OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—The Government has decided to call for new tenders for the steamship service between Canada and the British West Indies along the same lines as those specified in the tenders called for in January of 1926. New tenders must be in the hands of the department of Trade and Commerce by January 30, 1927. The terms of the Canada-West Indies trade treaty call for special steamship obligations as part of Canada's obligations. Only remains for these services to become operative before the whole treaty comes into effect.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The call of the tea hour is heeded by Arnold Bennett, the novelist, regardless of what is happening. "At this hour," he exclaimed, "I always have an overwhelming desire for tea." He jumped up in the middle of the rehearsal, gave his bowler hat a pat and hurriedly left the theatre. "I don't care what's happening, I must have my tea."

### DOMINIONS ASSUME NO LOCARNO BONDS

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Lt. Col. L. C. Amery, Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs, answering question in the House of Commons to-day, as to whether any of the British Dominions were now associated with Great Britain in responsibilities under the Locarno treaty, said if the question meant the assumption of obligations under the article in the treaty, dealing with mutual guarantee, the answer would be in the negative. However, he referred the questioner to the unanimous approval of the Locarno treaty by the Imperial Conference.

### CIVIL SERVICE ALLOWANCES MAKE TOTAL OF \$190,480.26

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—Civil Service superannuation allowances, granted under the Civil Service Superannuation Act of 1921, for the year ending March 31, 1926, totalled \$159,480.26, and were distributed between 206 former public servants, according to the Civil Service superannuation report tabled in Parliament. Contributions toward superannuation totalling \$5,506,063.31 were made during the year.

### FIRST YOUTH GRADUATES IN DOMESTIC SCIENCE COURSE

FREDERICTON N. B., Dec. 18.—Public closing exercises of Fredericton's night school last evening provided a novelty when, for the first time, a young man completed the cooking course, and had his display of doughnuts and other edibles on exhibition with the cooking class of the sixteen young women of the class. Merrill Tims of Forest Hill is the young man who has been first to take advantage of the vocational board's night school to become proficient in the culinary art.
