WHISKEY AND CRIME

As is well known, in every Province of Canada except Prince Edward Island the license system and the open bar are found. Here we have adopted the principle of prohibition. In other Provinces the governments, provincial, civic and municipal derive revenue from liquor licenses. Here we have no such source of revenue. We do not take the price of blood into our treasuries. If our system in that regard is better than the license system the difference should appear in the fruits.

And the difference is shown by the fruits. The prohibition Province is the freest from crime, as it is freest from the open bar. The statistics of crime prove this. The latest volume of the Canadian Year-Book gives the number of prisoners in all the prisons of Canada other than the penitentiaries. We need not quote them all. It would not be quite fair to do so. Quebec people are of a different race stock from ours. The prairie country and British Columbia have had large accessions of alien immigrants not yet fully assimilated.

We therefore take for comparison Ontario, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. All these have been long settled, with people whose ancestry was mainly from the British Isles. Below we give a table showing the number of prisoners and the proportion of prisoners to the total population in each:

In one respect the table is not quite fair to our Province. The figures are not quite down to date. Prince Edward Island is charged with eight prisoners whereas since prohibition has set into regular working our jails have been sometimes empty, or having only their keepers and some convicted whiskey sellers for inmates. But let that pass. Ontario is shown to have one jail prisoner for each 2,142 of population. If the Island had as many in proportion to population the table would give us 48 prisoners instead of the eight that are charged to us.

In other words, Ontario under the license system has six times as many prisoners in her jails as Prince Edward Island has under prohibition. But it may be urged that conditions are somewhat different from ours in Ontario. It is an inland Province and has some immigrant population. Take Nova Scotia and New Brunswick where conditions are the same as our own. They are maritime Provinces, like our own, were settled about the same time, by the same race stock and receive comparatively no immigrants. Yet in those Provinces the prisoners in jail are more than twice as many in proportion to population as in Prince Edward Island.

Here is something for the friends of the license system and the open bar to explain, if they can. It is something that the people of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Ontario, now hesitating to adopt prohibition, should carefully consider. It is something for the people of Canada to lay to heart. For the entire Dominion taken together has one out of every 2,780 of its people behind prison bars. Prince Edward Island under prohibition has less than one fourth part

as many in jail in proportion. Let the license system and prohibition be judged by their fruits.

SUNDAY ENTERTAINMENTS.

The Lord's Day Advocate recites the history of a case that occurred in St. John a few weeks ago in which two moving picture houses there proposed to give a Sunday entertainment, the pictures shown to be of a sacred character and no admission fee to be charged, but a silver collection to be taken to be divided between the Protestant and Catholic orphan asylums. Charges were laid that these shows were in violation of the Lord's Day Act. The Attorney General gave consent to the prosecutions and the cases came into court. Both defendants pleaded not guilty on the ground that giving the proceeds to the orphan asylums was an act of mercy.

The magistrate, Hon. R. J. Ritchie, in finding the accused guilty, said in part: "These cases which are before the court this morning are the thin edge of a wedge, and if any other case comes before me it will go up: if the police do their duty I'll carry it out. This plea that the proceeds were for the orphans does not make the matter better, for if the management wished to give to the orphans a performance might have been held on Saturday. So you see it was not necessary that the show be put on on Sunday. It is unlawful even to advertise in any way that a performance is to be held. It is not even right to say that a silver collection will be taken up, for that would only be another way of getting it instead of at the door by selling tickets, and a silver collection brings it within the statute."

As the managers did not proceed with the performance, and so far were only guilty of having advertised it, the Magistrate allowed the fine to stand, but warned them that should it be again attempted they would have to accept a double penalty.

The Tunnel social to be held at North Wiltshire tonight and to be addressed by Captain Read is the outgrowth of a capital idea. It is worthy of being repeated all over the Province.

Saint John has seventy-two citizens who pay tax on incomes of \$2,500 or more, the highest being that of Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, who pays on \$9,000.

The Scott Act is proving a pretty effective instrument for closing the bars in Sussex, Moncton and Fredericton, N. B. And the best way to advance to prohibition is to vigorously enforce the Scott Act in those sections where it is the law of the land. Laxity of enforcement, on the other hand tends to retrogression.
